The Legion team has won three games and lost four. It has three more games to play to the other teams' one, and if it wins them all, it has a chance at the pennant.

Nothing will be done about playing the championship games until the last of the postponed games has been played. A play-off series to decide the league championship will be necessary if the present tie is not broken by the end of the season.

BOLSHEVIST CHIEF DIES


POWERFUL SOVIET FIGURE VICTIM OF HEART ATTACK

MOSCOW, July 20.—(By Associated Press.)—F. E. Dzerzhinsky, chairman of the supreme council of national economy in the soviet government and one of the most powerful figures in soviet Russia, died suddenly today of heart disease at the age of 49.

Péix E. Dzerzhinsky, who long was one of the trusted lieutenants of Lenin, probably was best known while at the head of the Geka or Russian secret service police. Although personally a dreamy temperament and mild mannered, he was inflexible in his pursuit of those whom he considered enemies of the soviet republic.

Kentucky Race Recalls Betting Once Prohibited

LOUISVILLE.—Kentucky, now one of the few states in the union where pari-mutual horse race betting is legal, in its early days frowned upon "playing the ponies."

This year millions were bet on the races by Kentuckians, who little realized that 143 years ago, a man of Revolutionary war fame bet a mare on a horse race, was arrested and deemed, "an infamous gambler."

When Bubbling Over came home ahead of the pack to win the 1926 Kentucky Derby, more than two millions had been bet through the pari-mutuals. E. R. Bradley, owner of Bubbling Over is quoted as saying the day before the race "if Bubbling Over wins he will be worth \$500,000 to me."

In May 1783, Hugh McGary, who achieved fame at Blue Licks battleground bet the mare on a race at Higgins Path at Harrodsburg, Ky.

The court ruled that "Hugh McGary be deemed an infamous gambler and that he shall not be eligible for any office of trust or honor within the state."—This decision was pursuant to an act of the state assembly entitled, "An act to Suppress Excessive Gambling."

Betting became freer, however, after this and historical reports say that General LaFayette, while visiting Kentucky as a guest of Henry Clay, and watching his Imp, Yorkshire, and a number of imported mares run, "drank freely and lost twelve pounds on the horse races."

Mr. Henriksen resigned in order to accept a position as educational secretary for the Pacific Lutheran college at Parkland, Wash. At the Rev. Mr. Henriksen's resignation members of Trinity church immediately took steps toward negotiating union with St. John's, both congregations being of the same denomination.

The Rev. Mr. Lindseth resigned his pastorate in order to simplify the union. Committees are at work on the union question and the matter will be definitely settled at a later date.

The Rev. Mr. Lindseth has as yet made no plans for the future.

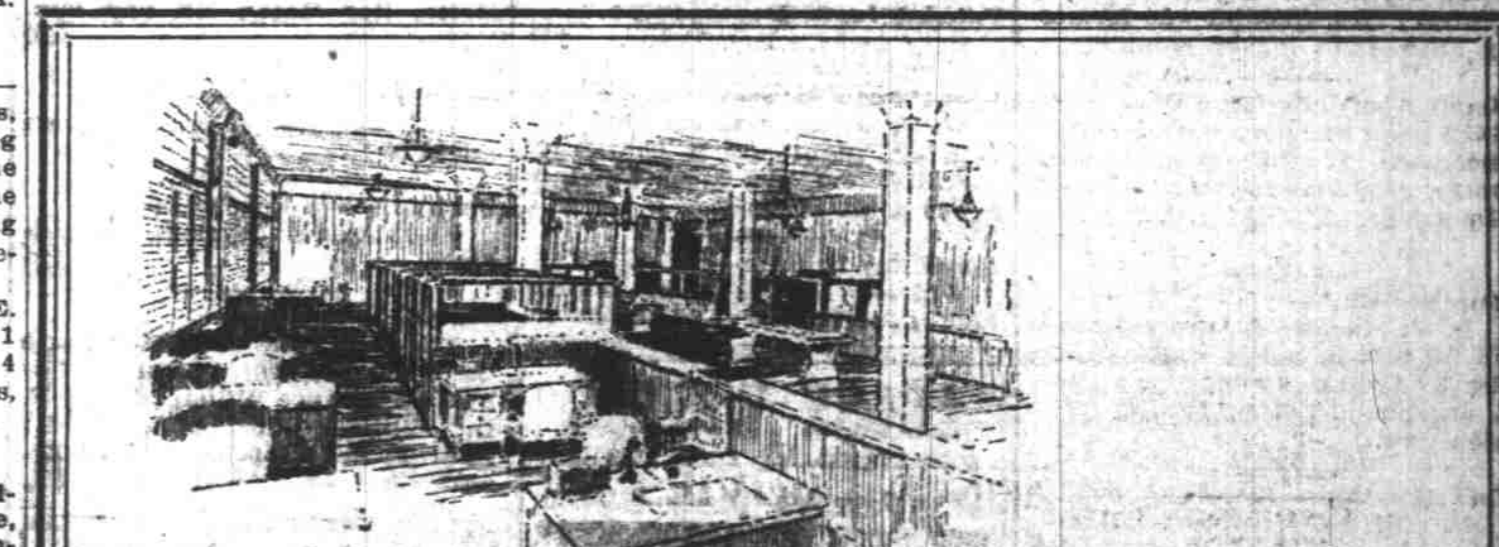
