

Oregon Man Wins Western Amateur Golf Championship In Minnesota

FRANK DOLP TAKES TITLE FROM STEIN

Portland Player Thrills Spectators in Magnificent Exhibition of Game

WHITE BEAR LAKE, Minn., July 24.—(By Associated Press.)—A slender, unassuming youth from the Pacific northwest—Frank Dolp of Portland—won the western amateur golf championship here late today.

A golfing machine with a magical putter, he trod the hilly White Bear Yacht club course through the day, persistently winning holes until he had defeated Bronson E. Stein of Seattle, 6 and 5.

Silent and without a smile, the 21 year old Portland star made his way, winning the very first hole, making the morning turn one up and improving his lead on the next two wins.

He was never down. The match terminated a week of wonderful golf for the new champion, who succeeds to the crown worn in the past by Kiefe Carter of Oklahoma City, who was put out this year in the second round by Stein. Dolp went into the championship rounds with a qualifying score of 77-72-149. His first and second round victories included the elimination of Harrison Johnston of St. Paul, medalist, and in those two rounds Dolp was never over par of 36-36-72. He played his quarter and semi-final matches under par, winning yesterday from Kenneth Hiser, Chicago, in 34-35-69 for the first 18, and taking a par 36 on the third nine the match ending in the last nine.

Today was Dolp's first match over par for 18 holes. He went out this morning in 38 and came home in 35 for 73, while his first afternoon nine was a par 36. He was two over par on the four holes played in the fourth nine. While Stein could not match this performance, his work was not far below it. Only for the first four holes did the Seattle man seem to have a likelihood of victory, but after the fifth hole Dolp's ultimate success seemed assured. It was after the fourth hole that Dolp started winning the magic

wand that was his putter, and it seemed to do his every bidding, rarely failing, and always carrying a heart-stirring threat even when it fell short or missed by inches.

GARDEN CITY, N. Y., July 24. (By Associated Press.)—The magic touch in MacDonald Smith's putter today carried the Lakeville professional to a sensational and record breaking victory over General Sarazen, the defending titleholder in their play-off for the 1926 metropolitan open golf championship.

Shooting a 66, seven under par, that clipped a stroke from his own record for the number three course of the Salisbury country club Smith emerged triumphant by a four stroke margin. Sarazen himself was three under par with a 70, but even such stroking as this was unable to match the uncanny accuracy with which Smith controlled his short game, pitching with deadly precision and sinking putts of four to 40 feet from all corners of the greens. It was a spectacular climax to an unprecedented struggle for a major championship of the links, setting a new endurance mark as well as witnessing an unusually high standard for scoring.

DEFEAT NEAR WHEN SAILOR HITS HARD

Tiger Has One Sad Moment When He Takes Count of Seven and Staggers

ASCOT PARK, Los Angeles, Cal., July 24.—(By Associated Press.)—Theodore (Tiger) Flowers of Georgia, negro champion of the middleweight division, skidded close to defeat in his non title fight with Sailor Eddie Huffman here today and then romped home a winner.

The Tiger's sad moment came in the third round when after punishing Huffman severely he went down under a sledge-hammer right to the jaw. The Georgia boy took the count of seven and came up groggy. Huffman, in a bad way himself from a barrage of blows which had landed on his face and stomach, tried to finish off the job he had started but failed from lack of strength and over-eagerness.

The fight from then on to the bell in the tenth was a story of lost opportunity so far as the sailor was concerned. The deacon from the south slapped, swung and punched the rugged sailor all around the ring. Huffman, to the disappointment of his backers, abandoned his old time boring in tactics and elected to stand off and box or wait a chance to land another punching right. He could not box the Tiger and the opportunity to land never came.

Ringsiders gave Flowers six or seven rounds of the ten rounds, Huffman a couple and one in doubt.

The fight was peculiarly devoid of clinching and infighting and was characterized by some of the wildest swings ever perpetrated in

these parts. Both men were long on this haymaking style, but as in most other exchanges the deacon copped the edge.

Flowers came out of the wrangle with a badly damaged left eye while Huffman's face was a study in scarlet.

The bout was fought under a broiling sun before a large crowd roughly estimated at between 15,000 and 20,000.

The weights were announced as follows: Flowers 167 pounds; Huffman 171 1/2.

CHICAGO, July 24.—(By Associated Press.)—Bud Taylor, Terre Haute, Ind., challenger for the world bantamweight championship, won from Tommy Ryan, of McKeesport, Penn., in the third round of a scheduled ten round bout at the White Sox ball park this afternoon on a foul.

The show, comprising four ten round bouts, was the second

staged in Chicago since boxing became legal in Illinois and drew a crowd of 9,000 to 10,000 fight fans.

Ryan was guilty of fouling Taylor twice before delivering the third foul blow. In the first round Ryan drove each sweeping left hook into Taylor's groin and Taylor sank to the floor in pain. He insisted on continuing, however, and swarmed all over Ryan for the rest of the round.

In the second round Referee Mike Bartley warned Ryan for hitting low and in the third, after a furious mixup, Ryan sent another left hook to the groin and Taylor doubled up.

Physicians, after examining Taylor, ruled that he was in no condition to continue.

The final bout between Petrolle and Adams was a whirlwind of action from the start until the eighth, when Petrolle knocked his opponent out with a right to the chin. Adams rolled over on his back and was counted out. For seven rounds they mixed like a couple of longshoremen, with Petrolle having the edge. He inflicted heavy body punishment and in the fifth had Adams on the verge of falling to the floor. Petrolle scaled 132 1/2 while Adams was two pounds heavier.

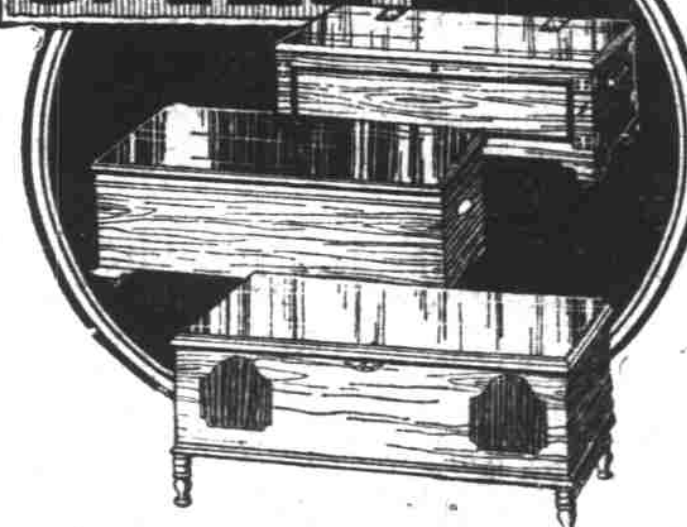
