

Robert Todd Lincoln, Last of President's Family, Died in Vermont

EMANCIPATOR' SON WAS 83 YEARS OLD

Rose to High Position in Public and Business World; Life Reviewed

MANCHESTER, Vt., July 26.—(By Associated Press.)—Robert Todd Lincoln, eldest son of President Abraham Lincoln, and the last surviving member of the Civil War president's immediate family, is dead. He passed away in his sleep at his summer home, Hilldene, early today. Had he lived until August 1, he would have been 83 years old.

Although he never sought public office, he rose to high position in both public life and the business world. He served as secretary of war under two presidents and was United States minister to Great Britain under President Harrison. He served for years as counsel for the Pullman company, became president and later chairman of the board of directors.

Advancing age and declining health caused Mr. Lincoln to retire entirely from business activity between two and three years ago. This year his health had been feeble and since he came to his summer home last May he had ventured out of doors but once each day and then only for an automobile ride. His health within recent weeks had not been noticeably poor, however, and he took his customary ride yesterday but this morning when servants went to awaken him they found him dead.

Mrs. Lincoln, two daughters and three grandchildren, survive him.

Mrs. Lincoln and two of his grandchildren, Mary Lincoln Beckwith, and Robert Todd Lincoln Beckwith, were at his summer home here when he passed away. Mrs. F. E. Johnson, daughter of Mr. Lincoln and mother of the children, was said to be in Washington.

Mrs. Charles Isham, his other daughter is passing the summer at her home here. His third grandchild is Lincoln Isham of New York.

Mr. Lincoln first came to Manchester 63 years ago, long before this Vermont village won fame as an exclusive summer resort.

After various visits he bought several hundred acres of mountain and valley land in 1902, and developed the estate that he had made his summer home ever since.

Mr. Lincoln was an enthusiastic amateur astronomer, and passed many hours in the observatory which he built on his estate. The property includes gardens, lawns and woodlands.

A simple funeral service will be held at the summer home here on Wednesday. Members of the family said it would be distinctly private.

The body will be placed in the vault of Delwood cemetery, Manchester, and later will be taken to Springfield, Ill., for interment in the family tomb.

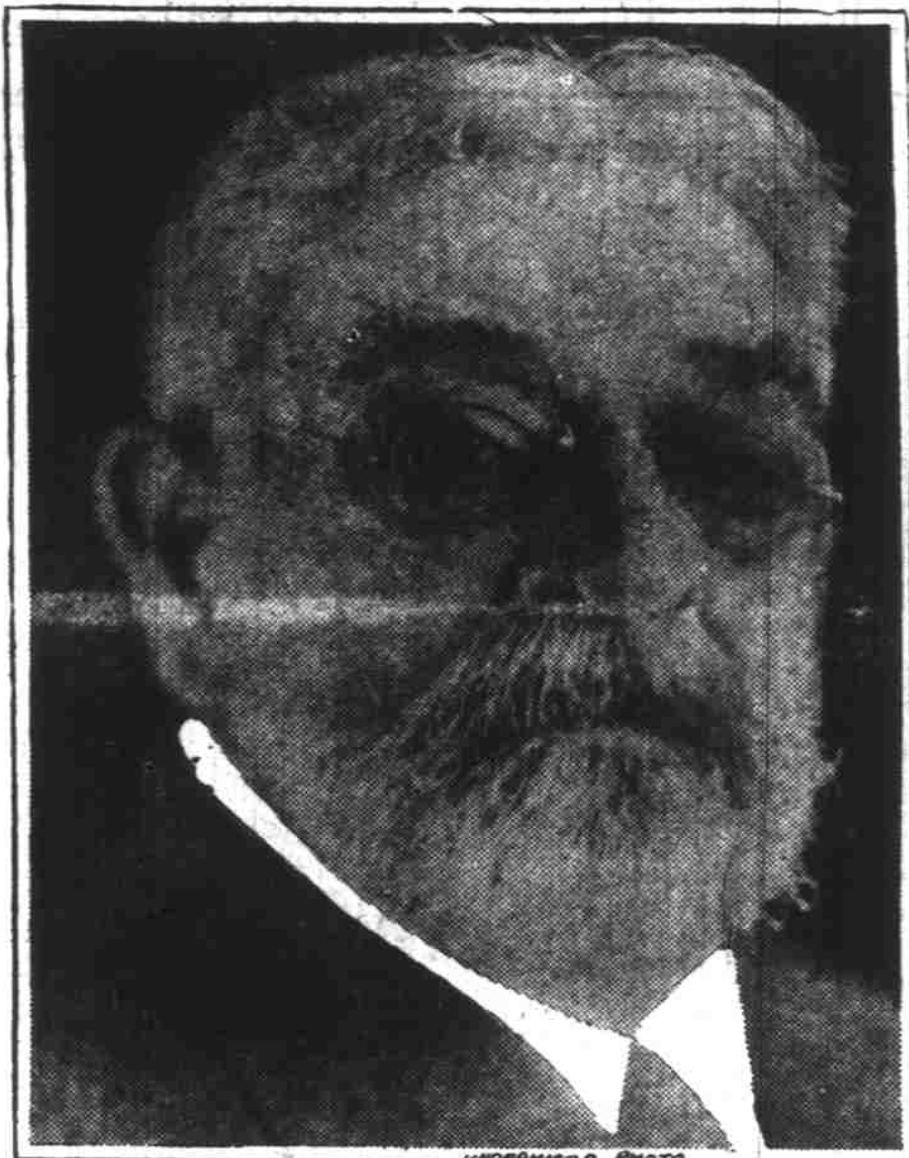

PEACH GROWERS NOW ORGANIZED

And They Ask Patronage of Their Home Grown and Quality Crop

The Willamette Valley Peach Growers' association was formed at an informal meeting of the peach growers of western Oregon at the Salem Chamber of Commerce yesterday afternoon. The meeting was called for 2 o'clock.

There were present in person or through representatives practically all the large owners of peaches in this section. J. R. Williamson and R. A. Cole of Corvallis represented the peach growers of the district of which Corvallis is the center. R. W. Hogg was present from Polk county, also M. C. Pettes. Hon. Alex LaFollette and A. M. LaFollette were there. C. M. LaFollette represented both the Wheatland and the Troutdale sections, where he has large orchards. James Imah and Schindler Bros. were present, and P. H. Fowler and A. Bunn and L. F. Townsend. Egan Bros. were represented. Hon. I. L. Patterson was present by proxy.

Temporary Officers
C. M. LaFollette of Wheatland was made temporary president, and M. C. Pettes of Salem, Route 11, temporary secretary.

It is proposed to perfect the organization, and to take in all the peach growers of the state. They hope to get in every acre of peaches in the state.

They fixed the prices of peaches for this year at \$2 for the best quality, down to \$1.50 for second quality peaches. The harvest of Crawford peaches is now on, and the canning season will commence for the Crawford, the latter part of this week. The Elberta peaches will be ready for canning about ten days later. The season is early; nearly a month earlier than usual.

The members of the newly organized peach growers' association say they have an abundant crop of high quality peaches, and they ask for home patronage for this home grown crop. They contend that peaches at \$2 a bushel, of about 50 pounds, makes the cheapest fruit that can be had for home canning—cheaper than other fruits.

The Oregon peaches are a home canning product. They are not suitable for commercial canning. But they are a wonderful fruit for home canning, and cheap, comparatively.

They are fresh. They are a tree ripened fruit. They are far and away in quality above the peaches that are picked green and shipped in, all shriveled up.

If you have not thought of canning peaches, now is the time to think of it. Can enough to last next year, for the crop of 1927 may not be abundant.

Your own peach growers, who have the best quality product for use that you ever saw, certainly deserve your support.

"EXERCISE MORE" PHYSICIAN URGES

Institute for Nurses and Doctors Gets Under Way; Gives Advice

People today do not exercise as much as nature intends them to, according to Dr. W. F. Draper of the United States public health service in an address to the institute for physicians and nurses being held this week at the Salem high school building.

We live indoors much more than people did 50 years ago, he said, and our houses are superheated, with dry air. When we go from this air into the cold, moist air of outdoors, we make ourselves extremely susceptible to colds. Our diet has also changed much in the last half century.

A person infected with a cold should take care of it, nurse it along, and keep it to himself, according to Dr. Draper. In this way its spread is best prevented. A cold is one possession not to be shared with others.

If a person catches cold and nurses it himself for a time, he should not run to the doctor and expect him to cure it immediately. It was brought out. Often a cold is the beginning of something else and leads to serious complications.

Dr. G. C. Bellinger, superintendent of the Oregon tuberculosis sanitarium, gave an address on "Chest Infection." Tuberculosis is most common in people between the ages of 15 and 50, he brought out. The sooner a child who is not up to par physically is taken to a physician, the better a doctor can cope with the problem.

The history of the medical man's development was traced by Dr. Walter Brown, director of the Marion county child health demonstration, at the evening session. He showed that the work of the physician is in keeping with modern highly specialized life, as the various fields of medicine and surgery have all been divided among specialists.

Nursing and public health as one of these specializations was brought out. Public health, at first, devoted itself to epidemic prevention and to sanitation improvement, but now it has reached a stage where personal hygiene as a preventive is the main field of work.

This work was shown to be the duty of the practicing physician, and the ways in which he might carry it out were discussed.

Miss Sara Place, R. N., superintendent of the Infant Welfare society of Chicago, spoke to the nurses on the development of the child welfare movement. Miss Place is a nationally known authority on nursing and health work.
