

Further Investigation is Ordered in the Los Angeles Mystery Case

AIMEE McPHERSON IS TO BE QUERIED

Second Grand Jury to Investigate Perjury Angle of Kidnaping Case

LOS ANGELES, July 29.—(By Associated Press).—Aimee Semple McPherson will face the witnesses from Carmel-by-the-Sea who identified her from photographs as resembling the woman who visited there ten days after the evangelist's disappearance, when the county grand jury next week again takes up the investigation of Mrs. McPherson's kidnaping story to determine whether perjury was committed at the previous inquiry.

This became certain today when subpoenas were issued for the appearance Tuesday of Mrs. McPherson, while an officer left for Carmel to serve similar papers on several witnesses.

Asked whether the new investigation was to determine whether the evangelist committed perjury when she told her story to the grand jury District Attorney Asa Keyes said:

"Yes, Mrs. McPherson or any other witness who testified before the grand jury."

Other developments in the investigation today include the turning over of fingerprints from the Carmel cottage to police experts for study and the alleged discovery of a new witness here who claims to have information placing the evangelist in Los Angeles June 19, four days before she appeared in Mexico.

Deputy District Attorney Joe Ryan refused to disclose the name of the new witness in the case, but said that he would testify before the grand jury. His information concerns a telephone call in which he was asked to drive a party to the Mexican border with the stipulation that he would drive only at night.

On the heels of Keyes' announcement of a new grand jury investigation, Foreman William Carter of the jury issued a statement placing responsibility for the new inquiry on the district attorney.

LOS ANGELES, July 29.—(By Associated Press).—The strange case of the disappearance of Aimee Semple McPherson, evangelist, and builder of Angelus temple here, will be taken before the Los Angeles county grand jury for the second time, it was announced today by Asa Keyes, district attorney.

Evidence uncovered at Carmel, Cal., some 300 miles north of here, prompted announcement by the district attorney that he considers it his duty to present to the grand jury evidence for it to determine whether perjury has been committed.

The previous investigation of the grand jury centered upon testimony of the evangelist that she was kidnaped at the Ocean Beach here in May, abducted and held for ransom in a shack near Agua Prieta and five weeks later escaped and walked some 20 miles across the Mexican desert to Douglas, Ariz.

The investigation by the city and county operatives from Los Angeles at Carmel centered upon the rental of a cottage in the Monterey county seaside town by a man they report having been identified as Kenneth Ormiston, former radio operator at Angelus temple. This cottage, the investigators reported, was occupied the day following the evangelist's disappearance from the Ocean Beach near here by a woman who sought to shield her identity by goggles and who remained there ten days with the shades to the cottage drawn.

Finger prints and hand writing of this woman were brought here by the investigators. The evidence was discussed at the district attorney's office today with his staff. The conference was followed by an announcement that

witnesses from Carmel and Monterey would be called before the grand jury next Tuesday.

Police identification experts tonight compared the finger prints found on a spice can in Carmel cottage with finger prints which they said were those of the evangelist. Mrs. McPherson had refused to have her finger prints taken, but police investigators declared they had obtained samples.

The finger prints being compared with the Carmel impressions said to have been obtained from an automobile door. The officers said it will be several days before they will complete their study of the prints.

The district attorney's office tonight sent a second officer north with a subpoena said to be for Salinas witness. The identity of the witness was not divulged.

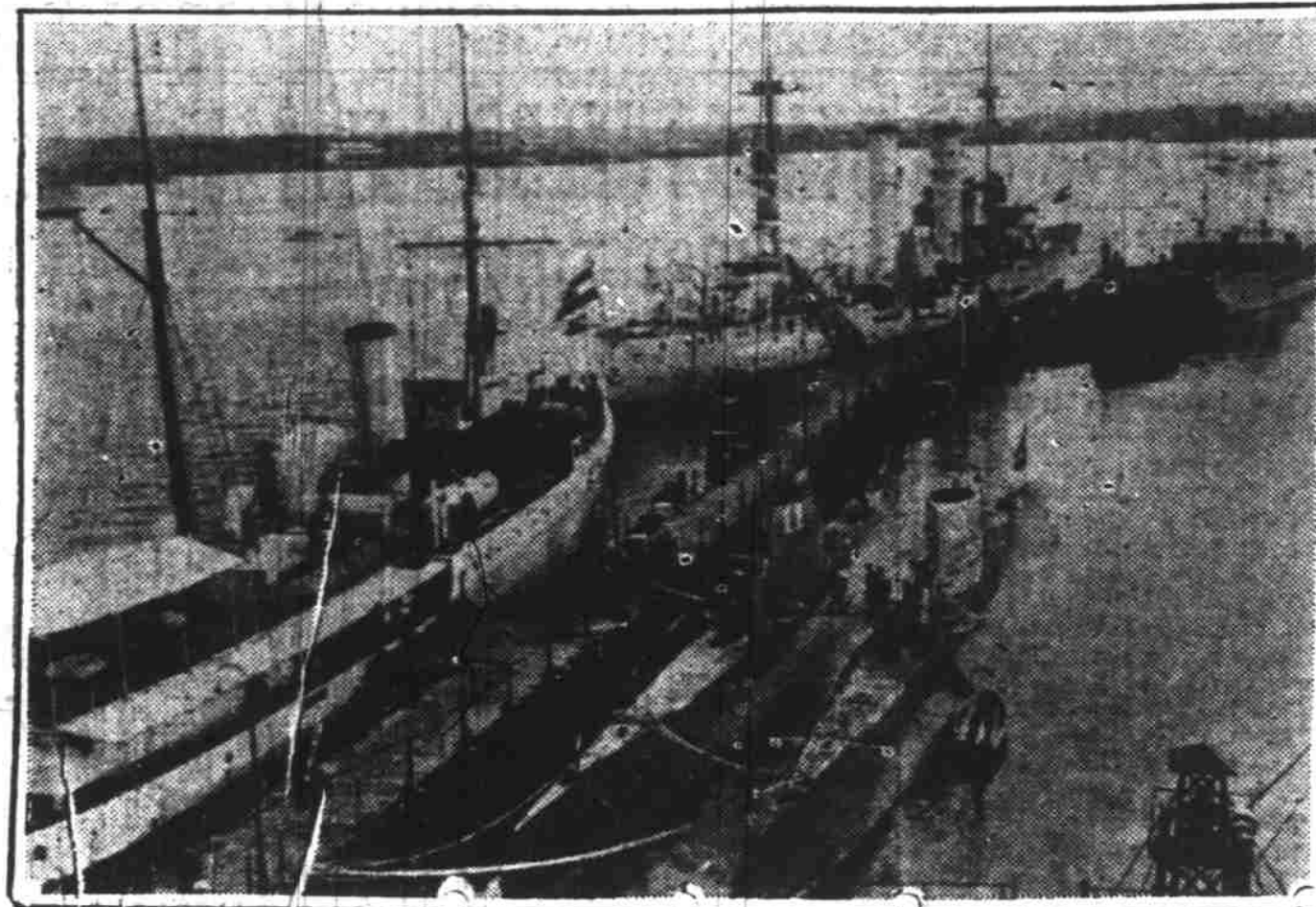

together of a group of men, like himself, can immediate action be taken.

LIQUOR RING IS BROKEN

90 ALLEGED LEADERS INDICTED BY FEDERAL JURY

BUFFALO, N. Y., July 29.—(By AP.)—The indictment of about 90 Buffalo and Niagara Falls men by the federal grand jury at Jamestown today for violation of the prohibition law signified the breaking up of one of the most important illicit liquor organizations in prohibition history in the belief of federal officials.

The organization had ramified from a few saloons in Detroit, and as far east as the Atlantic seaboard. United States Attorney Richard H. Templeton, who presented evidence of the huge rum conspiracy to the grand jury, stated that the government had made the greatest single stroke against bootleggers that it had ever accomplished. He said that about 4,000 gallons of alcohol was withdrawn monthly under permit from government warehouses.

NEW EVIDENCE AMASSED

CASE AGAINST MRS. HALL TO BE PRESSED, SAID

SOMERVILLE, N. J., July 29.—(By Associated Press).—Mrs. Edward Wheeler Hall, wealthy and socially prominent resident of New Brunswick, was in jail today faced with "a mass of new evidence" pointing to her as the murderer of her husband and his alleged sweetheart four years ago.

Prosecutor Bergen of Somerset county said he would take this evidence before the grand jury and ask for murder indictments against Mrs. Hall. The grand jury may be called for duty at any time.

The Rev. Edward Wheeler Hall was rector of fashionable St. John's Episcopal church in New Brunswick. The woman slain was Mrs. Eleanor R. Mills, a choir singer in his church.

The arrest of Mrs. Hall was made by state police and officers from Jersey City.

Governor Moore issued a statement saying that he intended "going through to a finish" with the prosecution of Mrs. Hall. The bodies of the minister and the choir singer were found under a crab apple tree with bullet wounds in their heads.
