

# Jack Dempsey Ordered to Appear in Court to Clear Up Contract Mess

## WILLS AGREEMENT MAY HOLD UP BOUT

Steps Are Taken to Prevent Holding of Match With Gene Tunney

INDIANAPOLIS, Aug. 3.—(By Associated Press.)—Jack Dempsey, heavyweight boxing champion late today was served with a subpoena to appear in Marion, Ind., superior court on August 13 to show cause why he should not be restrained from all ring action pending the clearing up of a contract he is alleged to have with the Chicago Coliseum club. The move was taken to prevent the title bout with Gene Tunney in New York September 16, the Chicago Coliseum club contending in a complaint which also was served on the champion that it had him under contract to box Harry Wills, negro challenger.

The hearing on August 13 will be on the question of a temporary injunction. Hearing on the matter of a permanent injunction was set for September 6. Dempsey was passing through Indianapolis from St. Louis enroute to New York.

## MOTOR BUS HEARING COMES TO PORTLAND

Third of Series of Meetings to Take Up Motor Transportation Matters

PORTLAND, Aug. 3.—(By Associated Press.)—The third of a series of regional hearings conducted by the interstate commerce commission to study information which would allow wise legislation for controlling motor bus and truck transportation, will be held in Portland Saturday, August 7. The first hearing took place at Chicago, July 27, 28, 29 and the second is now in session at St. Louis.

Oregon and Washington bus and truck line managers, highway associations, railroads, and others interested in highway transportation will be represented at the hearing, which will take place at the county court house under the direction of Commissioners Esch and Aitchinson. Commissioner Aitchinson is a Portland man.

Preparation of material from Oregon is in the hands of R. W. Lemon, president of the Oregon Motor Stage association, and J. M. Hudson, secretary.

Representatives from the department of public works for the state of Washington, accompanied by representatives of the automotive carriers and highway officials of Washington will arrive here Friday night in a special bus.

## SPORTS DONE BY NORMAN E. BROWN

The reunion of Grover Alexander and Bill Killefer on the St. Louis club—will it mean much to Alexander and the Cardinals? This question may be raised as the veteran pitching wizard labors to get into his old form.

The baseball world knows that Alec the Great was released to the Cards by the Cubs at the waiver price a short time ago after he had been suspended for failing to keep in condition. This shift might not mean much but for the fact that Bill Killefer, the man who caught Grover in the heyday of his career and later managed him successfully while piloting the Cubs, is now coaching the Cardinals and handling the team's pitchers.

Alexander and Killefer not only worked well together in the past but were friends off the field. While Alexander's recent slip from grace was due primarily to his discouragement over the kink in his arm, McCarthy's drastic action in the case would indicate also that there had been some feeling between the two before the actual occurrence which prompted the move.

Now Alexander joins company with his old catcher—and a man who knows him well. Killefer can do much toward setting Alexander on the right track mentally.

Alexander goes down in history as one of the great pitchers of all time. His control was his main asset, marvelous much of the time. Over the three-year period, 1915-1917, Alex set up one of the greatest records of baseball history. He was with the Phillies then. In 1915, the year they won the pennant, he won 31 games and lost 10. The next year he won 33 and lost 12. And the third year he won 30 and lost 13 games. In other words, a total of 94 victories and 35 defeats over a span of three full campaigns.

He served with the Phillies from 1911 to 1918 and then was sold to the Cubs for a couple of players and \$75,000. In 1920 he turned in 27 games and lost but 14.
