"Tunney-he's a good tough fellow, make no mistake about that. I think I'll beat him, of course, but don't think I'm taking him cheaply. He's strong, a good boxer and hard fighter."

On the trip from St. Louis which included a stop over in Indianapolis during which he was served with papers in legal action brought by Chicago promoters, Dempsey was accompanied by his wife Estelle Taylor Dempsey, and his trainer, Jerry Luvadis.




