

Dempsey Confident Gene Tunney Match Will Be Held Sept. 16

CHAMPION DECLARES HE IS NOT WORRIED

Challenger Not Under-Rated By World Title Holder; Certain of Victory

NEW YORK, Aug. 4.—(By Associated Press.)—If Jack Dempsey has any idea that legal or licensing obstacles will interfere with his prospective heavyweight championship battle with Gene Tunney on September 16 at the Yankee Stadium, he did not betray any trace of it upon his arrival in New York today.

Bronzed from effects of preliminary outdoor work, the champion made little of the injunction proceedings brought against him by Chicago promoters claiming to have a hold of his services, declared he was ready to make any move necessary to clear up the question of obtaining licenses here.

"I hope everything will be straightened out here so that I can be in camp and down to work not later than next Monday," he asserted.

Dempsey's application for a boxing license will be forwarded at once to the license commission of the state athletic commission, it was decided after the champion had conferred with Tex Rickard. Tunney's application also will be filed for consideration by the commission at its meeting next Tuesday.

"I'm in good shape now, and don't want to take any chances of going stale by waiting over here for any length of time," Dempsey said.

"Tunney—he's a good tough fellow, make no mistake about that. I think I'll beat him, of course, but don't think I'm taking him cheaply. He's strong, a good boxer and hard fighter."

On the trip from St. Louis which included a stop over in Indianapolis during which he was served with papers in legal action brought by Chicago promoters, Dempsey was accompanied by his wife Estelle Taylor Dempsey, and his trainer Jerry Lavadis. The champion has elected Gus Wilson, former trainer of Georges Carpentier, as general manager of his Saratoga Springs camp.

SWIMMING RECORDS ARE BROKEN IN EAST

Two New World Champions Are Crowned in Sesqui National Tournament

PHILADELPHIA, Aug. 4.—(By Associated Press.)—Two new national champions were crowned while a third retained her 1925 title in the opening events in the National A. A. U. swimming championships in the sesqui-centennial today.

Ethel Lackie of the Illinois A. C. defeated Doris O'Mara in the 100 meter event. The time was 1:14.25. Ethel McGary of the Woman's Swimming association of New York, had little trouble retaining her crown in the mile swim, winning by more than 35 yards over her nearest rival. Her time was 27:16.

Helen Meany, W. S. A. New York won the 10-foot springboard diving contest. Doris O'Mara's failure to repeat her 1925 triumph in the 100 meter event was due to her inability to keep her swimming lane. She took a lead at the start but crossed into a rival's and lost her advantage in getting back into her course. Miss Lackie won by five yards.

In the woman's singles Alberta Edlie, Tacoma, advanced easily with a victory over Betsy Asher, Portland, 6-1, 6-0.

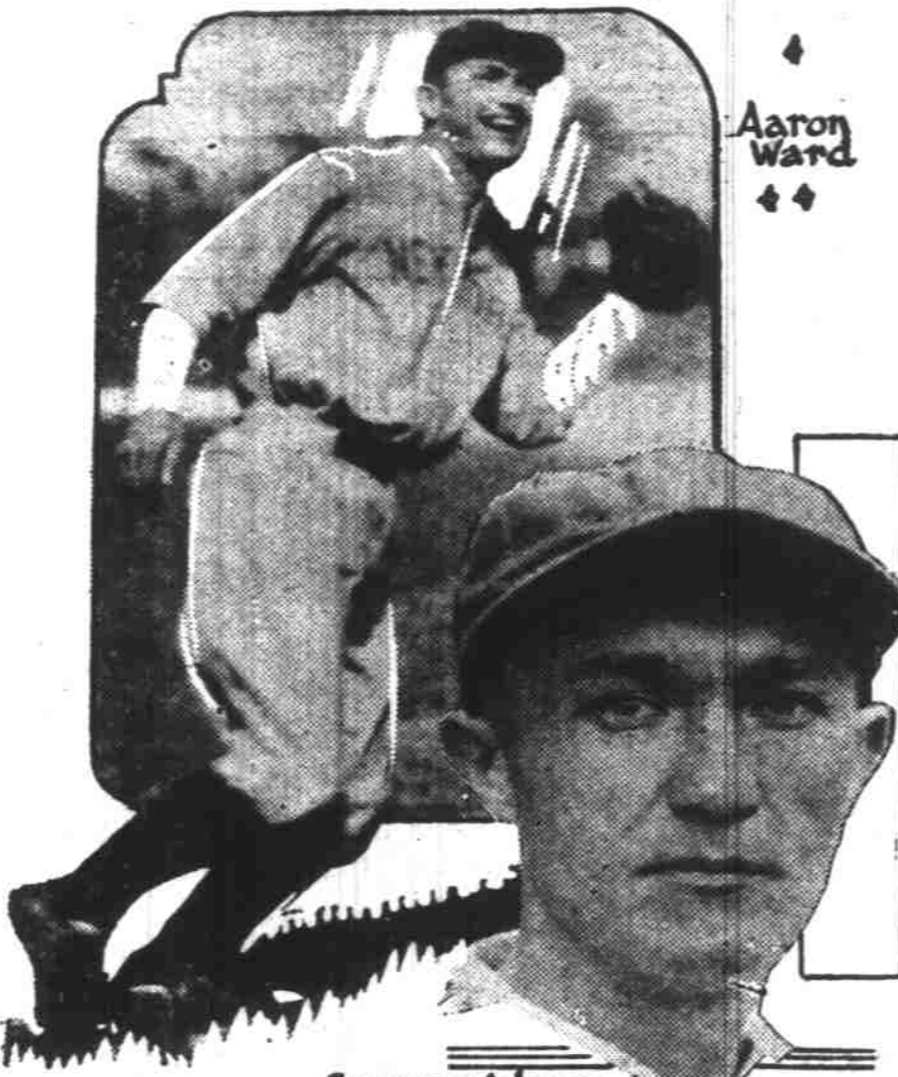
Rosemary Brunn and Carolyn Swarts of California showed far superior form to that of any other team in the women's doubles as the first round was completed.
