John C. Goplerud, company president, reports that at least 100 inquiries about Silverton prunes have reached the Silverton company from Northern Pacific patrons. Mr. Goplerud added that he believes these orders are the best advertisements that Silverton and the state of Oregon can have. The canner's motto, Mr. Goplerud reports, is "Every can put out under the Silverton canner label is a full page advertisement for Silverton."

The Silverton Food Products company is having a record run on blackberries and will put up a pack twice as large as that of last year. The company expects to put up 10,000 cases. The berries are also said to be of superior quality this season.
