CALIFORNIA TENNIS STARS WIN LAURELS

Mrs. Leachman Takes Women's Singles Crown; Herrington Is Victor

PORTLAND, Or., Aug. 7.—(By Associated Press.)—Two California tennis stars, Mrs. Ream Leachman of Vallejo, and Alan Herrington of Los Angeles won the feature events of the annual Oregon state tennis tournament here today.

Mrs. Leachman captured the women's singles crown for 1926 with a victory over Carolyn Swartz of San Francisco, last year's champion, 7-5, 4-6, 6-4. Herrington won the men's title easily from Henry Neer, Portland star, in three straight sets, 6-2, 6-2, 6-2.

Alan Herrington, paired with Carolyn Swartz in the mixed doubles won the championship of that event by defeating Mrs. Techman and Ray D. Johnson, Vallejo, 6-2, 6-3.

The women's singles match was the biggest upset of the entire tournament and one of the hardest fought matches played. A victory in the men's singles was predicted by Portland tennis experts for Herrington as soon as he had completed his first match here. At no time was the fulfillment of the prediction in doubt.

JACK DEMPSEY GOES THROUGH FAST PACE

Champion Puts on Gloves in Brisk Workout; Speed Declared Impressive

NEW YORK, Aug. 7.—(By Associated Press.)—Shifting his previous plans, Jack Dempsey put on the gloves today for the first time in a week and stepped through a hour's brisk workout at a local gym to keep himself from going stale during his enforced stay in New York.

The heavyweight champion boxed three rounds with Johnny Dundee, the veteran former featherweight champion, then stepped two more with a Canadian lightweight, Mickey McGowan, after which he shadow boxed and punched the bag for several minutes.

Considering his long absence from competition, Dempsey's speed and timing of blows were

impressive and convinced observers that a few weeks of hard work will put the title holder in close to old time form. Dempsey plans to road work in Central Park and engage in gymnasium workouts daily, pending the outcome of his application for a license to fight Gene Tunney here on September 16. The champion and his challenger are to appear before the state athletic commission to settle this issue next Tuesday.

DENVER, Colo., Aug. 7.—(By Associated Press.)—Jack Dempsey today was ordered to appear in United States district court August 17 to answer an injunction suit recently filed by the Chicago Coliseum club which claims to have a contract with the champion to engage in a bout with Harry Wills, negro challenger.

Dempsey claims that the contract was void, through failure of the club's representatives to live up to financial arrangements made at the time the contract was signed.
