

Albert Tozier's Scrapbooks Reveal Development of State History

STAGE TO STAGE EVOLUTION SHOWN

Pioneer Anecdotes, Histories
and Sketches Declared
Remarkable

SILVERTON, Aug. 9.—(Special to The Statesman.)—Perhaps the most interesting individual historical collection in the state is that of Albert Tozier, part of which is now on display at the Champcoo memorial building, of which Mr. Tozier is custodian this year.

At the age of 11 Mr. Tozier began his collection of clippings of Oregon people and Oregon events, and for 55 years he has continued clipping and collecting until now he has a library such as few, if anyone else, possesses.

To Champcoo visitors, Mr. Tozier explains his library which has been written by hundreds of authors, and he points to the vast amount of newspaper clippings pasted into scrap books, tacked upon the walls and piled upon the tables, telling them proudly that "this is but a small part of my collection. Most of it is at my Portland home, although I have some at Salem and at my ranch at Hood River."

Mr. Tozier's clippings and early pamphlet and newspaper editions have all been assorted, arranged, and filed alphabetically, and according to subject matter and time. Each one of the thousands of clippings is about some Oregonian or some Oregon project. For instance, there are scrapbooks filled with newspaper clippings of Homer Davenport, of T. T. Geer; in fact of every pioneer who has ever been mentioned as such in any newspaper. There is one group of scrap books, numbering well toward 100, devoted exclusively to happenings, no matter how insignificant, of Oregon pioneers. Another group contains clippings of golden weddings of Oregon pioneers, while there is also a clipping of a diamond wedding pioneer couple.

The whole of the history of Oregon is given in clippings saved from the time Father Blanchet came to do missionary work, on down to the appearance of the Rev. "Billie" Sunday in Oregon pulpits. Then one book contains clippings referring to Oregonians who lived to be over 100 years of age, while alongside of this lies a book of clippings of pioneers who only lived to be over 90 years of age.

There is a newspaper picture and an accompanying story of the first choir organized west of the Rocky mountains. This choir was in the old Taylor street church at Portland.

Another collection which Mr. Tozier prides himself in is that of announcements and newspaper pictures of Oregon triplets. This began way back in 1876 when the Shankland triplets were exhibited at the Oregon state fair to anyone who would pay the admission fee of 25 cents. "I guess their mother didn't think Oregon would

have any other triplets, but she has given us quite a number," he explains, as he runs through a number of pages each announcing a birth of three.

A collection which to some is amusing and to others is tragic is that entitled "When Oregon Was Wet." Still another is that of Oregon legislative events dating back to 1843, when on July 5 of that year the first legislative body of what later became Oregon was held, to the latest legislative reports. There is the roll call of white people who came to Oregon in 1843 with an accompanying list of those already here at that time.

A Portland street and street car directory for 1902 and a Portland telephone directory for 1903 are also on exhibit.

Through newspaper clippings one learns the history of the Willamette river almost before it was ever named, on down through the years during which it was an important means of navigation, up to the present time when scarcely over even a canoe passes by the old Champcoo building watching on its banks.

Not only is a record kept of the navigation, but there is another collection equally interesting which well might be entitled, from "stage back to stage," for it gives one the history of the early stage coaches, goes on through the period of railroads, and back again to stages.

Elmendorf will send from Seattle one of his assistants to sample and assay the property thoroughly. He will have with him an assaying outfit, so that this work can be done on the ground.

Mr. Elmendorf found a lot of good values in the ore in the tunnels that are being cleaned out and worked. How extensive the ore bodies are will be definitely shown by the sampling and assaying.

They Will Be Sure
There is not going to be anything taken for granted. There is to be no guess work.

One thing Mr. Elmendorf was willing to be quoted on definitely. That is, the ores there are perfectly susceptible to ordinary treatment. The values run in copper, gold and silver, with a negligible amount of zinc.

The forces working there are driving crosscuts and doing general development work.

A good deal of money has been spent in past years in that district—many thousands of dollars for road work alone. Fortunes were spent in the old days, before modern methods of treating those ores had been discovered. In the old days, there could have been no hope of profitable mining.

It is different now. There can be profitable mining operations carried on if the values show up as good as a cursory examination indicates, and if the ore bodies are sufficiently extensive to justify working on a large or considerable scale for a very long period of time.

WIFE KILLED, MAN DYING

WOMAN'S BODY DISCOVERED, RIDDLED BY BULLETS

NAPA, Cal., Aug. 9.—(By A. P.)—Mrs. Mary Webb, 39, was found slain, her body riddled with bullets and her estranged husband Charles Webb, was found nearby suffering from a bullet wound in the head which, physicians say, will cause his death, in the house on the Webb ranch near here late today. An automatic revolver was found near Webb.

While the sheriff's office expressed the opinion that the shooting was the culmination of a recent quarrel between the couple, officers also are investigating the possibility of the pair being attacked by an assailant.

SIERRA MADRA, Aug. 9.—J. F. Sharpe, 73, tonight shot and killed his wife, aged 70, then turned the pistol on himself, dying a short time later. The shooting occurred in the grounds of a sanitarium here where Mrs. Sharpe was employed as a cook. Officers said they believed Sharpe shot his wife because he objected to her continuing work as a cook.

MOVIE ACTOR ARRESTED

GEORGE SHEPHERD SAID IMPLICATED IN DEATH PLOT

LOS ANGELES, Aug. 9.—(By Associated Press.)—George W. Shepherd, 34, motion picture actor and former policeman, was arrested in Hollywood today and believed by police to have been implicated in a plot on the life of Marco Hellman, Los Angeles banker and sportsman. Shepherd is being held on "suspicion of felony," police records show.

The arrest of Shepherd followed a "tip" from a woman and police said that while shadowing him they discovered operatives of a private detective agency engaged in the same work.

A black-jack, an empty pistol holster and two large knives were found in a search of Shepherd's home, police said. The officers said that Shepherd was a member of the Kansas City police force from 1918 to 1920 and that of Houston, Texas, from then until 1923, when he came to Hollywood and engaged in motion picture work.

SUB SINKS, FIVE KILLED

BRITISH DIVER IS SWAMPED WHILE BEING MOORED

LONDON, Aug. 9.—(By Associated Press.)—The British submarine H-29 sank at its moorings in the Davenport dock yard near Plymouth late today. Five men lost their lives, the admiralty having listed their names as missing. Various reasons are given for the accident. One is that the submarine was inclined at too short an angle by the drawing of the hawsers as it was being moored; another is that it went over too far in a tilting test, permitting the water to flow in the open hatches. Six men on deck at the time of the accident were able to jump clear of the craft and were rescued.

The H-29 sank in 28 feet of water. Salvaging operations were immediately begun.

CHILD KILLED BY FATHER

3-YEAR-OLD TOT MISTAKEN FOR PROWLING ANIMAL

PINE CITY, Minn., Aug. 9.—(By Associated Press.)—A three-year-old girl, mistaken for an animal prowling about the chicken yard, was shot and killed by her father near here early Sunday.

The victim, Elsie L. Kokkelphe, was the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. William E. Kokkelphe. Evidently she was walking in her sleep when the fire from her father's shot gun struck her in the abdomen.
