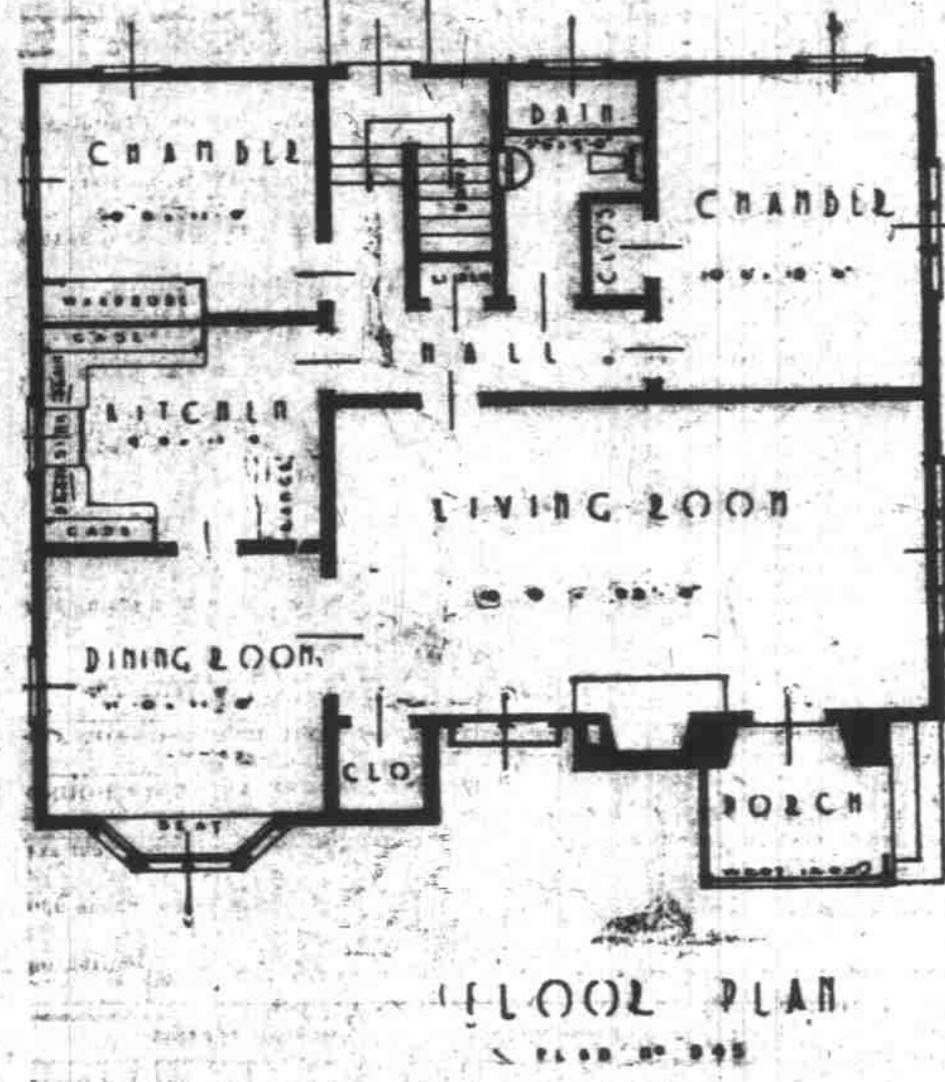
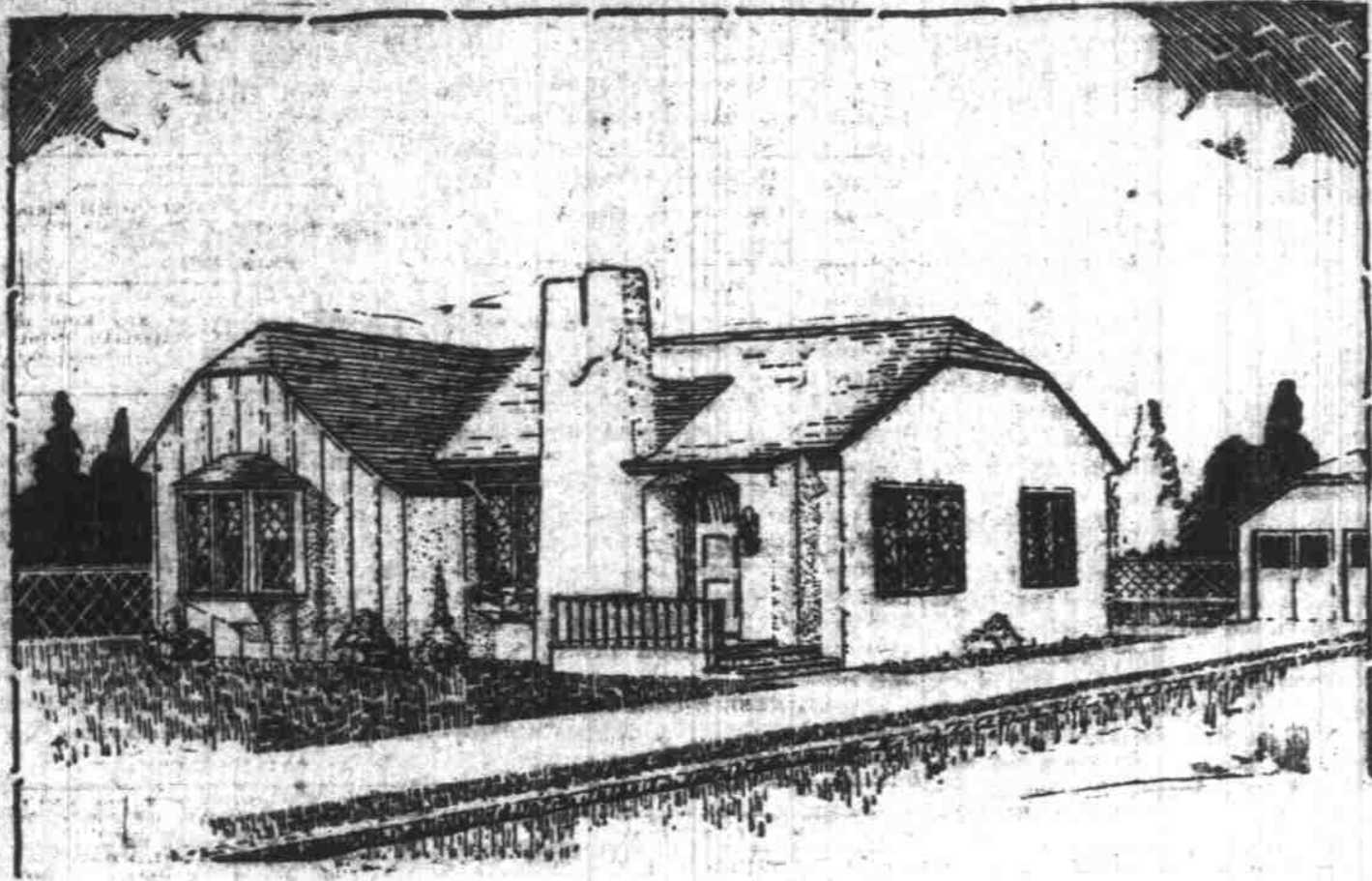


Banner Building Year Forecast With Home Construction Starting

GIRLS' LOCKERS WILL BE BUILT

Attic Space to Be Converted Into New Department for Students

With remodelling of the western end of the senior high school building practically completed, work has begun on the eastern end, where a girls' locker room will be built on the third floor, in what is now attic space. A little electric installation,

painting, and cleaning up is all the work remaining on the west end, where several new classrooms and a music room have been made.

The new girls' locker room will be above the gymnasium, 60 by 30 feet in size. Lockers without partitions between them will be built into it. The present girls' locker room has partitions, but they have been found useless.

Stairways now lead from the second floor to the attic, in which the room will be built. As they lead to the door of the gymnasium they will furnish all the needed access to the new room, eliminating the task of building new stairs.

The job is not expected to take much time, according to E. S.

Barker, in charge, but will probably be finished this week. This will be the last of the remodelling to be done on the building this summer.

Russian Peasant Finds Movies Still a Luxury

SAMARA, Russia.—(AP)—The post revolutionary peasant differs from his pre-revolutionary prototype not alone in externals—such as dress and habits—but he has acquired new tastes.

Though still fond of his melancholy airs, he is no longer content with mere song and dance. In a comparatively short time he has become a moving picture fan, and not infrequently walks ten miles to see a bit of pale, whirling, whizzing life.

A regular moving picture house is still an undreamed luxury in the typical Russian village. Hence the portable picture apparatus—machinery, films and all—carted from village to village, usually by a troop of young communist scout boys.

The apparatus works but poorly. There are frequent and long interruptions. The picture is rarely if ever accompanied by music, unless the local harmonica player volunteers his services. A large percentage of the sightseers cannot read headlines, making it incumbent upon the few intelligentia present to chorus titles, thus crudely feeding famished curiosity.

Tulane Assures Stadium Opening a Record Crowd

NEW ORLEANS.—(AP)—One of the earliest football advance sales on record in this part of the country has just been brought to a successful conclusion by Tulane University.

Supporters of the Greenbacks, undefeated in 1925, set out in the midst of summer to see that the new stadium to be opened at Tulane in the autumn will not lack for cash customers. Six games in New Orleans will be played on the Tulane schedule and warrants good for the full half dozen were retailed at \$13. The stadium, built as a result of contributions of more than \$300,000 from friends of Tulane, will seat 28,000 spectators at football games. It will be formally dedicated October 23 when Alabama Polytechnic Institute (Auburn) will play here.

Tulane will play a part in the dedication of another new stadium, furnishing the opposition for the University of Missouri when the new Columbia stadium is opened October 2.

Roast Pig With Lots of Dressing Is Cuba's Dish

HAVANA.—Cuba's national dish is roast pig.

The pig, 20 to 40 pounds on the hoof, is stuffed with a dressing made with a bread base, to which is added spices to suit the individual taste. It takes the place of honor on "Noche Buena" (Christmas Eve) instead of the familiar American turkey on Christmas day.

The most popular dish is chicken and rice. The chicken is stewed and the rice steamed separately. They are combined with a few strips of a mild red pepper grown in Cuba and placed in an earthenware dish and baked. Sometimes eggs or saffron are added to the rice.
