Olsen Players to Under Auspices of Salem Dramatic League

The Salem Dramatic League wishes to announce for the season of 1926-27 the return of the Moroni-Olsen Players in the following plays:

"Dear Brutus," a phantasy by Sir James Barrie.

"Outward Bound," a drama by Sutton Vane.

These plays will be given at the Elsinore on Oct. 21st and Jan. 27th respectively, and the success of the Moroni-Olsen Players in Salem last year assures the Salem Dramatic League that their return will be appreciated.

Extending its activities the Salem Dramatic League, and others, will also present during the coming season a course of three lectures by eminent and internationally famous men.

Dhan Gopal Mukerji, the famous Hindu author, philosopher and poet who lectured in Salem some years ago, will speak on "The Present Crisis in the East."

Carl Sandburg, the greatest American poet since Whitman, will give readings of Mr. Sandburg's book "The Prairie Years" which is considered the best biography on Lincoln ever written. It has already run into several editions.

Dr. Wilfred T. Grenfell, of Oxford and London, will give the story of his thirty-five years of service among the deep-sea fishermen of all the world. Dr. Grenfell is a distinguished international figure. He has founded and now operates a string of hospitals, orphanages, schools, educational, industrial and nutritional centers in bleak parts of the globe. He holds the only honorary M. D. ever bestowed by Oxford and is besides Companion of the Order of St. Michael and St. George and a Fellow of the American College of Surgeons. His lecture is illustrated with moving pictures.

The above lectures will be presented at Waller Hall on November 22nd, January 17th and March 7th respectively. Ticket prices for both plays and lectures will be announced later. Any profits derived from the sale of tickets go to the Salem Dramatic League Fund to be used solely for bringing superior attractions to this city.
