

Washington-Oregon-Sand Island Testimony Concluded at Conference

FUNDS AT STAKE, NOT BOUNDARIES

Senator Stanfield Continues
Fight to Regain Cash
for Oregon

ASTORIA, Aug. 24.—(AP.)—Presentation of testimony to support the claim of the state of Washington to Sand Island, a large sand flat lying in and near the mouth of the Columbia river, before the United States senate sub-committee which has been investigating the rival claims of Oregon and Washington to the island, which is valuable only as a site for commercial fishing operations, and a trip of inspection to the island itself by the senatorial party, featured the activities of the inquisitorial body here today.

The senatorial party and the group of witnesses who attended the hearings left for Portland late today. Attorneys who have been taking part in the hearings stated that the matter was practically concluded with the exception of the report of the committee to congress in December, adding that a brief hearing might be held in Portland tomorrow and that the legal departments of the two states had been asked to submit briefs in connection with such legal questions as might be involved in the controversy.

Leaving this city early this morning the party went by ferry to the north shore of the Columbia where they inspected the north channel between the state of Washington and the island at low tide.

Following this, the party continued to Ilwaco, Wash., where testimony was presented to back the Washington claim that the island had moved northward in the Columbia river to a point where it was now a part of the state of Washington.

Witnesses for the state of Washington were Henry McGowan, of Medwau, Wash., prominent fish packer; H. S. Darke, editor of a Chinook, Wash., newspaper; Charles R. Pollock, supervisor of fisheries for the state of Washington; Chris Hansen, of Ilwaco, for lease of the island from the government; and Dan Wheelon of Ilwaco.

Testimony was introduced to the effect that the north channel of the Columbia had filled to an extent where a person could walk from the Washington mainland

to Sand Island without finding more than a few inches of water at low tide. The main tenor of the testimony was to the effect that the island had become part of the state of Washington by the law of accretion.

The commercial fishing interests in the matter were brought out by testimony advanced by John Veatch, chairman of the Oregon state fish commission, who declared that if Sand Island was returned to the state of Oregon that under the law all moneys derived from sale of fishing rights on the island amounting to about \$42,000 a year would be spent in propagating fish in the Columbia river to the benefit of the people of both Washington and Oregon.

Mr. Veatch pointed out that this method of expenditure was not mandatory under the Oregon law and stated that in the past revenues derived from the Columbia river fishing interests by the state of Washington had been expended in propagation work on Puget Sound. Charles Pollock, Washington supervisor of fisheries, declared it was the policy of the department of fisheries of the state to spend revenues in the district from which they were drawn.

The party returned to Astoria after a trip through the north channel at high tide in a United States customs launch.

Senator Stanfield, before leaving for Portland, declared that there was no intention of settling any boundary question through the medium of congressional action, saying that the only matters at issue were the bills introduced in congress by himself to recede the island, originally ceded by the state of Oregon to the war department back to the state of Oregon and to return the revenues derived from the island by the government through the sale of fishing rights, amounting in all close to \$400,000 back into the coffers of the state of Oregon.

"I introduced these measures and the Washington delegation opposed them on the ground that the island belongs to the state of Washington. We are having the hearing to determine the merits of the bills in question and not to settle any boundary disputes or the question of any boundary lines established by the United States supreme court."

plac places for vehicles was passed in 1884, and prohibits vehicles from making a "stand" in front of any one's place of business.

The purpose for which this ordinance was passed, according to a statement made by Mayor John B. Giesy last night, was to curb the activities of dray and transfer men who in those pre-motor days made a practice of having stands for their vehicles where they would leave them day in and day out when they were waiting for business. The ordinance does not, he says, give owners permission to prohibit parking of cars for a reasonable time in front of their premises.

Many business property owners have marked off the curbs in front of their stores, and some have tried to restrict parking to customers, it is said, and for such reasons the council passed its last measure. Many residence property owners have also undertaken without just cause to prohibit parking in front of their houses, it is said.

Valentino's Bier Draws Tribute Fit For Kings

Thousands Line Up Before Funeral Parlor Doors Are Opened,
Rich and Poor Joining in Final Ceremonial. Police
Reserves Are Called

NEW YORK, Aug. 24.—(AP.)—Rudolph Valentino today attracted to his bier such crowds as gather to pay tribute to a dead president or a king.

Thousands of men, women, and children throughout the day jammed the streets of the Broadway funeral parlors where the body of the actor lay in state following his death yesterday at the height of his career, which lifted him from a humble position to the stardom of a movie sheik.

Women wearing fashionable clothes vied with poorly dressed women of the tenement districts in the struggle to gain an advantageous position to be among the first to view the body.

By 4 o'clock, the time set for the opening of the funeral parlor doors to the public, more than 12,000 persons were gathered on the damp streets outside.

Shortly before the doors were to be opened, a large plate glass window of the funeral parlor was crashed by the on-swinging ranks. Three women were cut when they were shoved through the gap of

en tore at one another with their hands, kicked with their feet and even attempted to climb to the shoulders of others.

Before the doors of the funeral parlors were opened, all pieces of statuary, painting and bric a brac were removed from the lower floors of the establishment.

Valentino, alive never drew such a crowd as when dead. Some wept as they waited for hours in the street.

Whole crowds milled outside. The actor's body was placed in a simple silver bronzed casket in the ornate gold room of the funeral parlors. The coffin was surrounded by yellow gladiolas and surmounted by a single red rose. The body was dressed in formal evening attire. It was to lie in state until midnight. The public was to be allowed to view the body tomorrow and Thursday from 9 a. m. to midnight.

Funeral services will be held at 10 o'clock Monday morning in St. Malachy's church. Father Edward P. Leonard, who heard Valentino's confession before he died, will officiate.

After the funeral, the body will be placed in a receiving vault in Woodlawn cemetery, unless Alberto Guglielmi, the actor's brother, who is on his way to New York from Paris, has arrived by that time. He is to decide the place of burial. S. George Ullman, who was Valentino's manager, will urge the brother to per-

mit the body to be buried in Hollywood, California.

Floral offerings were received at the funeral parlors continually throughout the day. Some of these were simple, inexpensive offerings, apparently sent by persons in humble circumstances. They were placed in the parlors with the more expensive floral wreaths, which also arrived in large numbers.

Among those who will be asked to act as honorary pallbearers are Will Hays, Mayor Walker, Joseph Schneek, Adolph Zucker, Marcus Loew and Hiram Abrams.

LURID ARTICLE VENDERS HELD

Conviction Follows Alleged
Explanation of McPherson
Kidnaping

LOS ANGELES, Aug. 24.—(By Associated Press.)—Four news venders were convicted by a jury in municipal court here today for selling obscene literature in distributing a San Diego newspaper which contained a lurid article dealing with the disappearance of Alcee Semple McPherson.

The verdict was returned by a jury of six men and six women after a deliberation of two hours and 30 minutes. The four defendants, John C. Brooks, Emanuel Goodman, Sam J. Steinberg and Harry Smith, were instructed to appear for sentence tomorrow. Each faces a maximum punishment of a \$500 fine or six months in jail, or both.

Milton Golden, chief of defense counsel, announced he will seek to have the verdict set aside, and if he fails in this, will give notice of appeal to superior court. The defendants were released under

\$500 bail each pending sentence.

Mrs. McPherson, who took the witness stand for a few minutes during the trial, was informed of the verdict.

"Neither I nor any member of Angelus temple had any idea what the article was about, and for that reason I have no comment whatever to make," she said.

Mrs. McPherson was called as defense witness near the close of the trial. Her testimony was confined to answering a few questions by Attorney Golden regarding her acquaintance with the defendants, and whether she had discussed the case with the prosecution attorneys. In reply to opening questions she gave her occupation as "evangelist and minister of the gospel."

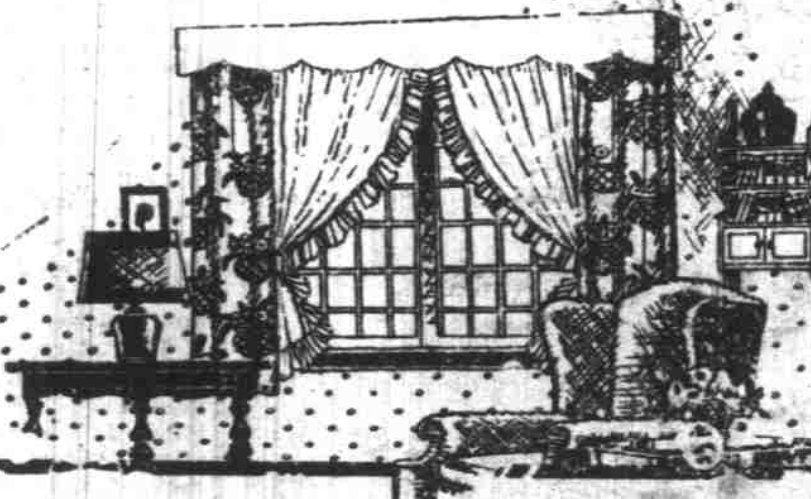

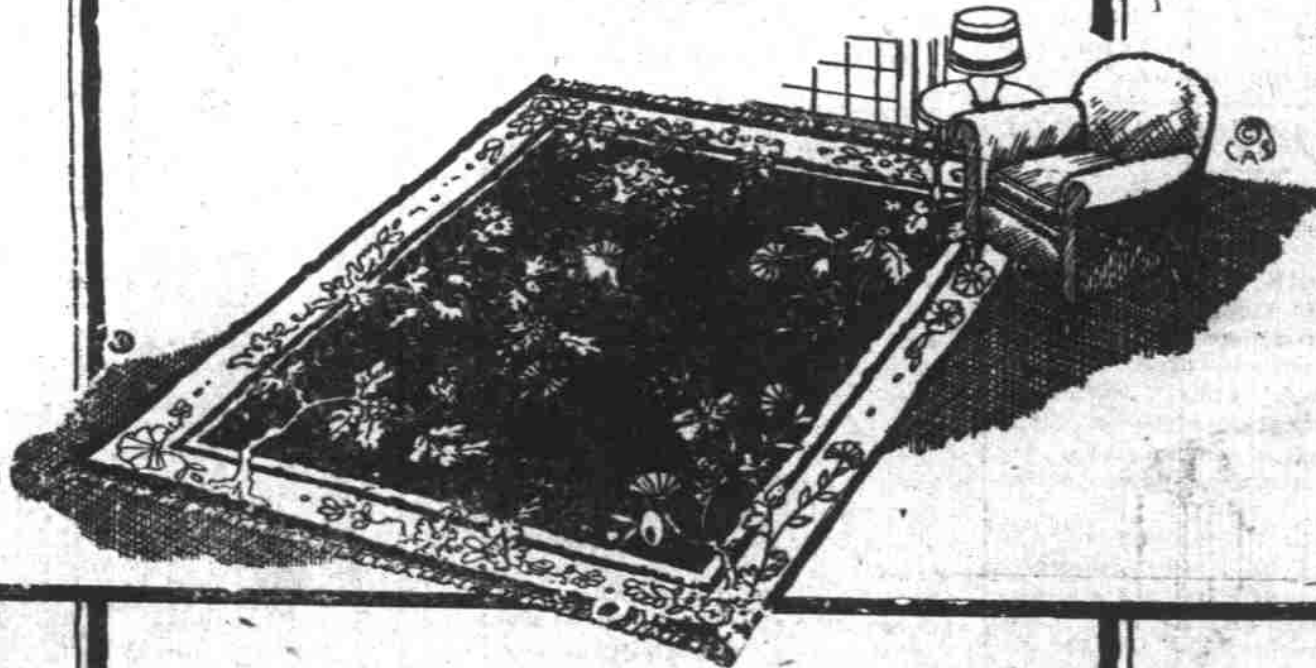
