A distinctive wedding of the late summer season was that of Tuesday, August 24, at the Jason Lee Methodist church, when Miss Catherine Ritchie, choosing her birthday anniversary as her wedding day, became the bride of Reverend Leroy Hilton Walker. The impressive service was read at 8 o'clock before a company of friends completely filling the church auditorium and annex.

Reverend Thomas A. Acheson performed the ceremony, using the single ring ritual.

Charcelly any church in Salem has ever been decorated for any wedding in a lovelier manner than was Jason Lee on Tuesday evening. The altar itself was a garden of autumn flowers all leading to the white gateway arranged as a portal from which white crepe paper streamers hung. Low lattices, with ivy entwined, were arranged on either hand. Innumerable ivory baskets, brimming with zinnias, dahlias, gladioli and asters, in shades of rose, lavender, bronze, and blue, were placed in profusion in the chancel which was outlined with crepe paper ribbons, arranged with single flowers at intervals. White archways stood at either side at the rear of the church, while white ribbons and clusters of flowers

marked the pews. The choir balcony was also decorated with white and with flowers.

Immediately after the groom, the best man, and the clergyman had entered through the archway on the left, the bride and her attendants advanced to the altar through the arch on the right.

The bride was exquisitely lovely in her wedding dress of white georgette, fashioned with tight bodice and full skirt, fitted at the waist line by means of three rows of hand-shirring. The skirt of the wedding gown was beautifully ornamented with motifs of moire ribbon. The shimmering, full-length veil was worn as a coronet with a wreath of orange blossoms arranged in a star-like motif against the dark hair of the bride. The bride's bouquet was of lovely roses in shades of delicate pink and lavender scabiosa. A three-strand string of pearls, the gift of the groom, was the only ornament worn.

Miss Neva Walker and Miss Beulah Fanning in Nile green georgette, Miss Gladys Walker and Mrs. Earl Strausbaugh in coral, Miss Sybil Smith and Miss Frances Lemery, both in lemon, and Lucille and Jeanette Evans, the flower girls, one in turquoise blue and one in lemon yellow, made a picturesque company as they preceded the bride to the altar, each bridesmaid carrying an arm bouquet of gorgeous gladioli and wearing a scintillant ornament in her hair. Lucille, the first little flower girl, wearing ruffled yellow voile, carried a gilt basket tied with blue tulle, while Jeanette, dressed in ruffled blue, carried a gilt basket, with yellow bow. The little girls, cousins of the bride, scattered white rose petals in the pathway to the altar.

The groom was attended by his brother, Ray Walker of Pomona, California, as best man.

The six ushers, clad in dark blue coats and white trousers, were Frank Ritchie, Howard Roberts, Clarence Church, George Lindsay of Pomona, California, Merle Bonney, and Arthur Bonney.

Immediately before Mendelssohn's wedding march, which was used as the processional, Mrs. Cora Hendry sang "All For You," Miss Clarice Ritchie, a cousin of the bride, accompanied, immediately following with the wedding march. Miss Joan Evans played the violin obligato. As a recessional the Lohengrin wedding march was used.

As soon as the vows were said, Professor Herman Clark sang a beautiful wedding number, "Love's Coronation," with Miss

Gladys Gilbert at the piano.

A formal reception was held at the parsonage immediately following the benediction, with the bridal party forming the receiving line. Miss Luella Kaighlin greeted the guests at the door. During the evening Miss Gladys Gilbert and Mrs. Arthur Bonney were in charge of the gift room. The bride was made the recipient of all manner of lovely gifts in linen, silver, pictures, china, electric pieces and glassware.
