

Entries for Horse Show at Oregon State Fair Will Close September 20

MANY NEW EVENTS ON 1926 PROGRAM

More Than \$5000 in Premiums and Awards to Be Given Best Horses

Entries for the six-night horse show, feature of the annual state fair, September 27 to October 2, will close this year on September 20, says an announcement issued today by Jay M. Reynolds, in charge of the event, and early registrations and inquiries indicate a larger showing of show animals this year than ever before.

To make the competition particularly attractive to owners the fair board at its last meeting doubled the premiums for the show, bringing the total to more than \$5000, with six separate stakes of \$250 each, which are expected to bring in the greatest aggregation of California, Oregon and Washington horses that have ever been seen in a state fair show.

One of the banner events of this year, and one which has proven its popularity with the thousands who flock to the night shows, will be the competition between six horse teams, a full class of which has already been assured by the entries to date. This competition will continue through four nights to determine the awards in two classes for the most suitable teams for draft purposes and for the best driving.

Five championship events are included in the classification as announced. They are champion rooster in light harness, champion heavy harness horses, champion three-gaited saddle horses, champion five-gaited saddle horses, and champion hunters, each event carrying champion and reserve champion ribbons.

Among the special exhibition and feature events that are being arranged will be night drills by the Oregon Agricultural college military department and the Portland Hunt club, if negotiations now being conducted by the fair management are successful. Other features are also planned to fill out the full week, the night horse shows having been extended to cover six instead of five nights this year.

ARMY MENTOR WILL GREET CANDIDATES

Nine Out of Eleven Eligible Lettermen Promise Coach to Return

EUGENE, Ore., Sept. 6.—(AP)—Less than two weeks remain before football practice will start at the Pacific Coast Conference college. On September 15, Captain John J. McEwan, new Oregon football coach, and a staff of seven assistants, will greet the University of Oregon candidates.

Eleven lettermen are eligible, but so far only nine have promised to be on hand.

Silverton Fire Started When Iron Is Overheated
