That is the very situation coming to the Elsinore Tuesday night when "Love 'Em and Leave 'Em," is being presented by the William Streett's New York Players.

Janie Walsh is the spoiled young sister who gets Mame into all kinds of trouble, even hinting that she is a thief. Mame tries to be brave, especially when Bill,

whom she loves, has transferred his affection to the scheming, underhanded Janie.

Enough of the plot—Mary Daniel is Mame, Helena Shipman plays Janie, Tom Chatterton is Bill and George Cleveland is the old duffer who always knows which horse is going to win.

There are no outstanding roles in this three-act comedy laid in the lowest west side in New York. Lem is sleek-faced and haired, and hides his bottle under the piano. It's just another entirely different characterizations for Cleveland, who is always splendid. Mary Daniel is the one whose motto "Love 'em and leave 'em," is tossed to the four winds at the final curtain. And Chatterton plays his part well, although the role isn't a strong one. 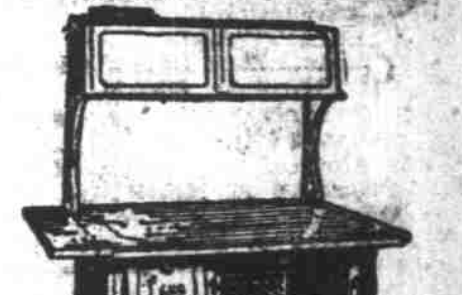

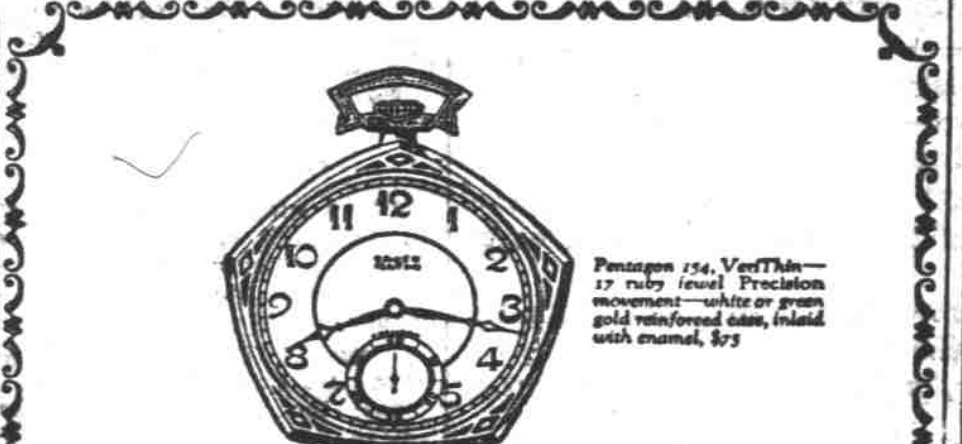
