

The cottage type dwellnig adapts itself readily to artistic design, and with proper attention to floor plans the maximum of cozy comfort may be worked out in three well arranged rooms of modern size. For one or two people the design shown here has proved ideal and with slight modifications, may be made to suit families of three or four mem-

The siding exterior with its simple lines, well placed window spaces and hooded entrance is quaintly attractive and has an appeal for the home lover not found in many larger houses. ornamental shutters, flower boxes and bits of shrubbery give pleasing dashes of color.

Interior of the house is well arranged for comfort and convenience. The vestibule leading from the entrance with coat closet attached preserves the privacy of the living room and offers a place for disposition of hats and coats.
