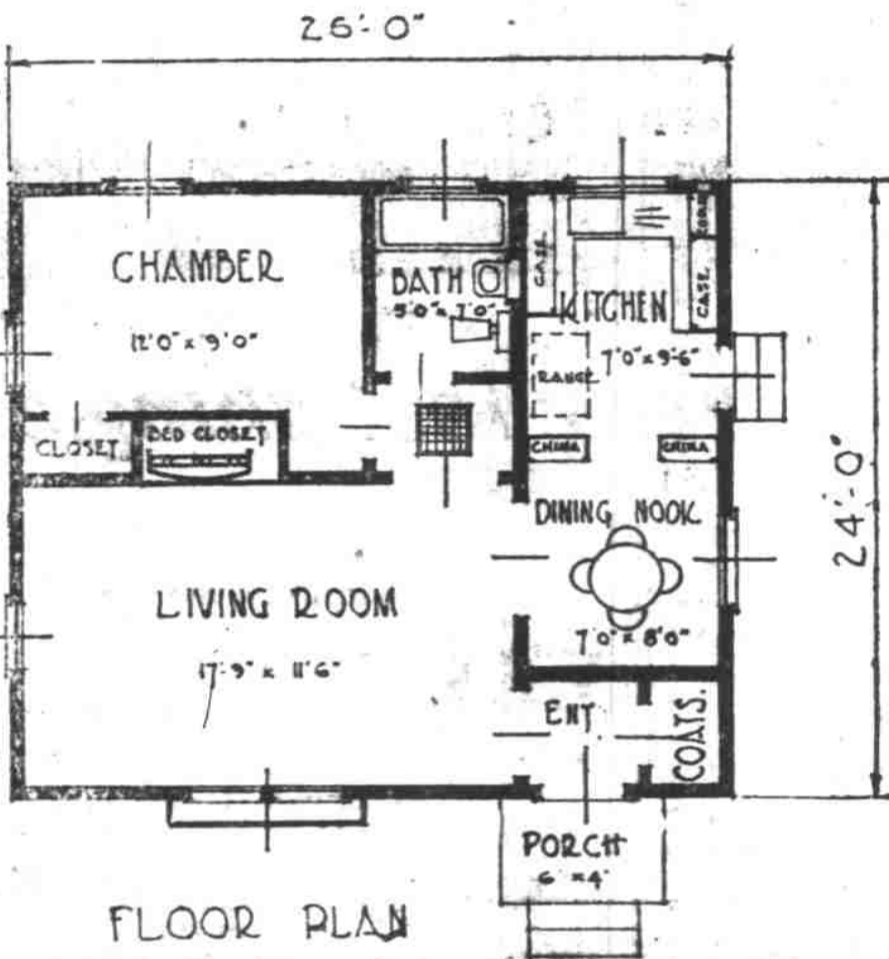
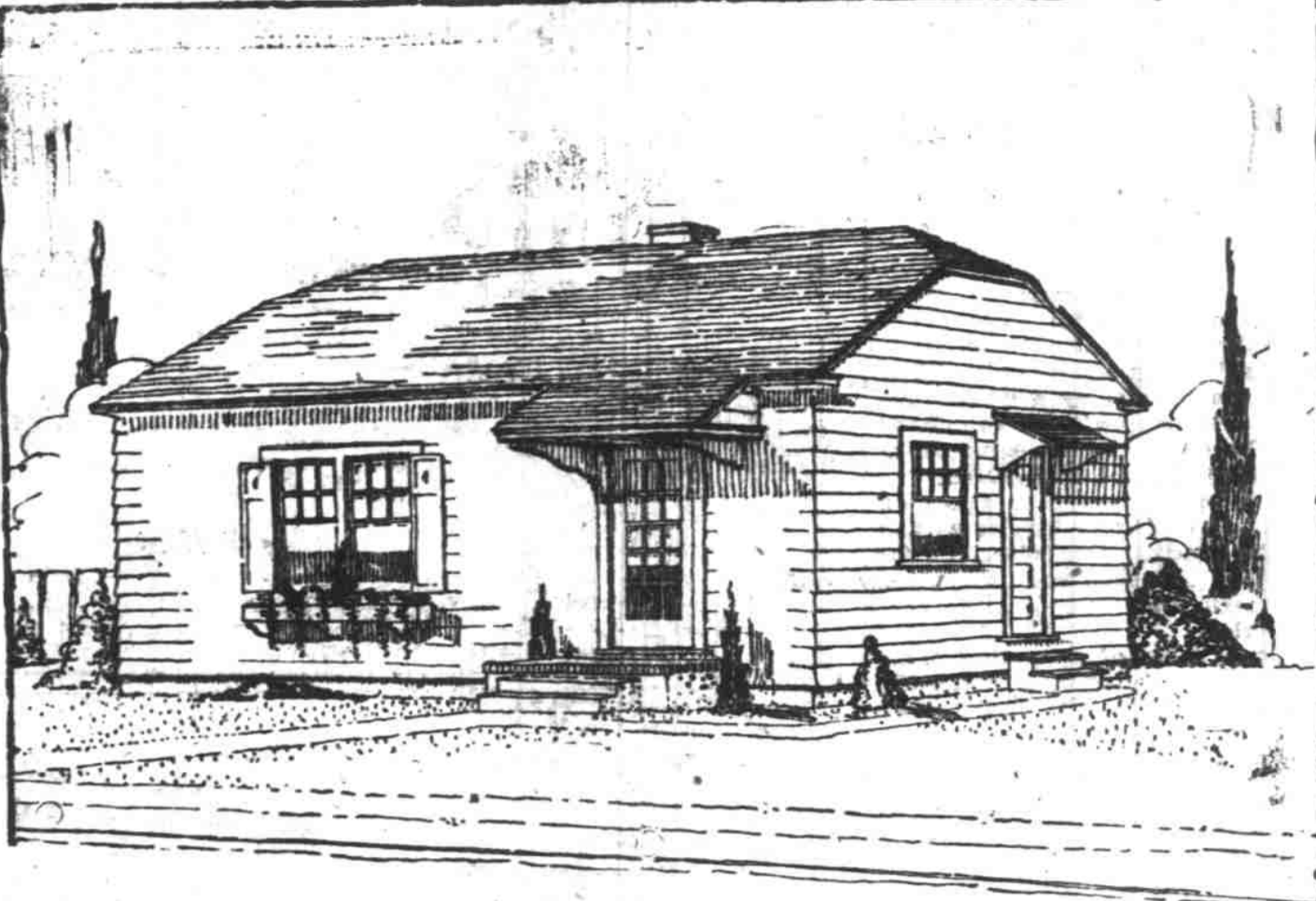


Banner Building Year Forecast With Home Construction Rushed

The cottage type dwelling adapts itself readily to artistic design, and with proper attention to floor plans the maximum of cozy comfort may be worked out in three well arranged rooms of modern size. For one or two people the design shown here has proved ideal and with slight modifications, may be made to suit families of three or four members. The siding exterior with its simple lines, well placed windows and hooded entrance is quaintly attractive and has an appeal for the home lover not found in many larger houses. Ornamental shutters, flower boxes and bits of shrubbery give pleasing dashes of color. Interior of the house is well arranged for comfort and convenience. The vestibule leading from the entrance with coat closet attached preserves the privacy of the living room and offers a place for disposition of hats and coats. The French door affords ample light and will suggest a variety of furnishing schemes to the housewife.

The living room is light and airy and the closet for wall bed adds another room when desired. The well lighted dining nook between the living room and kitchen is a delightful arrangement and the kitchen itself is just large enough to operate without wasted steps. A chimney may be added for furnace connections and cellar steps also if a basement is desired. The one sleeping room is of ample dimensions and its windows insure cross ventilation. With its closets and bath the chamber completes a charming layout of living quarters for one or two people, married or bachelor. Floor space comprises 624 feet, calling for modest construction cost.

WORK ON THEATER ALMOST FINISHED

Frank Bligh Will Announce Opening Date of New Show House Tuesday

The opening date of Bligh's new Capitol theater will be made public Tuesday, it was announced yesterday by Frank Bligh, owner. Work is nearly completed, and many portions of the building are ready for occupancy now.

Seats are being put in the auditorium and the organ is being installed. The scenery will be put in this week, as rigging for the stage is now being built. Scenery is on the ground and only waiting until the rigging is ready for it. A dome is being built over the theater entrance as a replica of the state capitol dome, and from this the theater takes its name. This dome will be finished about the first of the week, according to Mr. Bligh.

Sidewalks on the State and High street sides of the building will be finished soon. They are being built in a fancy pattern of two colors. As soon as the walk is ready, many office renters will begin to move in, as the offices are practically complete now and will be opened for inspection soon.

Several of the first that will occupy the store compartments on the first floor are fixing the rooms and decorating them to be ready for moving in as soon as possible. There are 14 of these store spaces.

Decorating of the auditorium is rapidly nearing completion. The decorations are in the Florentine style and are designed in a dignified and massive manner in keeping with the dignified name of the theater.

All scaffolding has been removed from the building and the floors are cleaned and ready for painting. Electric light fixtures for the auditorium which are a combination of parchment, silk and wrought iron, will be installed Monday.
