GUARDING THEIR LIVES

The men of the state traffic division, cooperating with the secretary of state and the state highway division, are among the hardest worked as well as the most useful servants of the public in Oregon—

And the least appreciated and the most abused.

For the last four years, Salem's chief of police has requested the help of the state traffic officers in patrolling the highways and streets leading to the state fair, and this has been gladly granted, for the fair is a state institution—owned by all the people of Oregon.

This year, the same four traffic officers who have been on duty at each succeeding fair have had charge of the main entrance ways. They have learned the danger points and the proper directions to avoid accidents and traffic jams, and they have been doing a wonderful work in keeping the ways clear and safe.

There are twelve traffic officers in all charged with keeping order on the highways leading to the state fair. They are drawn from near by districts, and they patrol the highways for 25 miles in every direction. They patrol them till twelve at night.

Their task is to keep the highways safe. They give 100 or more warnings for every arrest they make. They know that 95 per cent of the drivers of cars are law abiding and honest, and careful. But the best driver is sometimes confused or bewildered—

And these traffic officers are out in all weathers, at all hours of the day and far into the night, to guard the lives of the people on the highways. They have no desire to simply show their authority. They are courteous and kind. Such are the orders of their chief, T. A. Raffety, who is in charge of all these men, all over Oregon—

And such orders they obey, not only because they are official orders, but also because they feel that way. They are picked men. They are not merely small town policemen, or the common run of big city policemen, either, who are the blood brothers of the small town officers. The state traffic officers gather statistics for the secretary of state and the state highway departments. When there is an accident on the highways, they send the wounded to the hospitals, call the doctors, attend to the needs of the stranded friends and relatives. They have many duties, and perform them well.

They have uniforms; they must have, in order to do their work; to show they have authority, in cases of wrecks or jams or violations of the traffic laws or other laws of the state—

But they buy their own uniforms. They are not dolled up at the expense of the state. There is not a finer body of men performing such duties in any state or country.

Oh, yes, there may be an exception, once in a while. A petty tyrant, "dressed with brief authority," may get on the force; but he does not remain. And even a good man may make a mistake—

And the above does not go for the typical small town policeman, or his big town blood brother, who thinks he must make himself a tin tyrant in order to show his authority, and thus become a nuisance and an annoyance and hindrance to the well intentioned public, instead of a help. This misplaced muttonhead is the fellow who does more than any other one thing to make hard the tasks of such men as make up the force of the state traffic division.

THANK YOU; COME AGAIN

To the state fair crowds: Thank you; come again. That is the sign you will find on the highway as you leave one of the pretty little cities of Oregon—it is Dayton, is it not?

This goes for the wonderful crowds of men and women who have visited the Oregon state fair this week, or who will come or stay for the last day of the great exhibition.

You will find next year some improvements that have probably suggested themselves to you. You will find still more improvements the following year—

Facilities for handling the still greater crowds; accommodations in the immense and growing plant that could not be made up to the present time, for lack of funds, or because no one dreamed there would be such great crowds to accommodate.

The Oregon state fair is the biggest and best west of Minnesota, and it will be bigger and better with the growth of this state. It belongs to the whole people—it is your fair. Perhaps the time will be here soon when it will be self supporting, with money enough to spare for yearly additions to the plant—just as the new automobile building was erected from money saved from past fairs; mostly from the one of last year.

Thank you; come again.
