IS THE JOB HIS FOR KEEPS?

(Eugene Guard.)

Is Charles L. McNary a United States senator by divine right? he supremely anointed? Has he preempted the office which he olds for another term or for life? Does a resolve by any voter or croup of voters to vote for somebody other than he in the election of 1930 constitute treason against the flag or conspiracy against the public well being? Is it wicked to hold the thought that someone lse might entertain saner and sounder ideas on such political subects, say, as farm legislation than he? Is the McNary record so far bove criticism or reproach as to entitle the senator to keep the seat e holds forever or until death doth part it and him?

If the answer to all these questions is yes, then the Portland fourgal is quite right in its shrickings and its mounings because of a tell plot which it thinks it has discovered, on the part of a group of about prune juice (meaning moonrominent republicans, to support the candidacy of somebody else shine), and about the young lady against the senator four years hence. If the answer to these questions s yes, then the charge which the Journal says is made by A. E. Clark that somebody will run against Senator McNary is a serious charge. If the answer is not yes, then the whole clamor is piffle and the great hullabaloo raised by the Journal is quite senseless except as political buncombe. The above questions from the Eugene Guard, however cynically designed and inspired, are fair questions. Here are he answers, given without the knowledge or consent of Charles L. McNary or his friends:

No, he is not a United States senator by divine right; he has not preempted the office for another term or for life; nor does a resolve by any voter or group of voters to vote for somebody other than him at the 1930 election constitute treason or conspiracy-

For this is a free country, and, especially in Oregon, it is not only lawful but quite the fashion for all sorts and conditions of self-starters to run for office.

But the writer will say that the candidates who enter the primary election against Chas. L. McNary, in case he shall decide to run, will know they have been in a race; and the same will hold true of the Democratic candidate.

If it is radical to offer a scheme of farm relief that will work, then Senator McNary is a radical-

But so are the great majority of the farmers of the United States, and they will yote almost in a body for candidates who stand with Senator McNary. There have been many schemes for farm relief offered, but not one of them gives or will give the relief that the farmers of this country ask for-

With the exception of the McNary (or McNary and Haugen) bill, in the opinion of the farmers of this country.

They know the McNary bill does not offer a bonus to the farmers, nor is it paternalistic, any more than any law authorizing companies or associations to organize and carry on their business. It merely offers 100 per cent cooperation to any group of producers of a major crop with an exportable
