

Hydro-Electric Measure Held Fraud by Schuebel

Multnomah County and Portland Would Be Only Ones to Benefit by Bill Speaker Tells Kiwanis Club

"Outrageous, unfair, and unjust" were epithets applied to the so-called Housewives hydro-electric bill by Chris Schuebel of Oregon City at the Kiwanis club luncheon yesterday.

"The bill is a scheme and a fraud," Mr. Schuebel exclaimed. "It was gotten up solely for the good of the city of Portland, Multnomah county and Portland are robbing the rest of the state blind in state tax matters."

This measure should be scrapped at the coming election, Mr. Schuebel claimed, along with the Dennis resolution, the Seaside normal school, the eastern Oregon normal school and the eastern Oregon tuberculosis hospital.

DUDLEY G. HENRY, PIONEER, PASSES

Well Known Civil War Veteran, Resident of Salem Dies Suddenly

Dudley G. Henry, 83, veteran of the Civil War, died Saturday at his home in Salem, where he had lived since the death of his wife about a year ago. Preceding this, he had lived on a farm at Spring Valley.

Mr. Henry was born in Pike county, Missouri in 1843. He was the third oldest in a family of four sons and four daughters, all of whom died before him.

He enlisted in the infantry when the Civil war broke out, serving as a private in two companies of Missouri regiments. He took part in the battle of Vicksburg, the Red River campaign, and other noted engagements.

He was discharged in August, 23, 1864, at which time only 21 men were left in his company, the others having died.

He sailed for the west in 1868, coming by way of Cape Horn, and spent a year in California. Following this he was a stock raiser in Klamath county, Wash., until 1876, when he went to the Willamette valley and married Nancy Walker, daughter of Major N. M. Walker, an early pioneer.

Mr. and Mrs. Henry lived on their farm in Spring Valley until Mrs. Henry died in September, 1925.

Mr. Henry is survived by three sons, W. W. Henry of Spring Valley, Claude W. Henry of Los Angeles, and Wayne D. Henry of Salem, besides one grandson, Kenneth Henry.

copy. Thus the adoption of new texts would have entailed both heavily increased outlay for new books and an economic loss of the value of the old books in the hands of the pupils.

"My second reason for proposing the above motion was inspired because the schools were to open in many sections of the state within two weeks. The desks were already supplied with the old texts, and it would have been impossible to secure distribution of new texts in less than six to ten weeks. Confusion and turmoil would have resulted in the schools all over the state.

"My motion died for want of a second. It also was ruled out of order by the chairman of the commission." (Mr. Miller was chairman of the commission at the time of the meeting in November of last year.)

"Early the following morning I was called into consultation with two members of the commission, George Hug of Salem and A. C. Hampton of Astoria. It was agreed that if I would renew my motion in a different form so as to be in order, they would go down the line with me. The minutes of the meeting show that the three school men on the commission, Turner, Hug and Hampton, voted for the old books which were re-adopted. The records show the opposition of the remaining two members of the commission to such a plan. It also discloses the apparent friendly feeling of at least one member of the commission to the publications of the firm, in whose interests I had been approached.

"My failure to play in with or be directed by his close friend on the commission apparently put me in disfavor with the governor.

"The primaries in May resulted in my nomination on the democratic ticket for state superintendent of schools. The governor, in the course of the campaign had given out that he would appoint to the post, not I, but a man by the name of Mr. Chubb, the successful candidate in the primaries. When, pursuant to this statement, the governor appointed me to the position, I accepted it.

"No mention was made to me by the governor at that time, or at any subsequent time, as to the advisability of my remaining a member of the state textbook commission, though he had ample and frequent opportunity to do so.

"Last Wednesday while I was in Pendleton for the purpose of attending the Umatilla County Teachers Institute, the governor called me by telephone and told me that I was no longer a member of the state textbook commission. I protested such summary action, and the taking advantage of my absence from Salem to dismember me from the commission. I told the governor that I felt, as a member of the commission, I had saved him much grief in not following the ill-advised course of his friend on the commission.

"It also said that I had rendered a distinct service to the state in the time I had taken. I requested him to postpone his action for three days until I could return to Salem and consult with him. I also advised him that I desired to continue a member of the textbook commission, and that I intended to serve without compensation.

"He would not accede to my request for three days grace, and replied that I was no longer a member of the commission. When I inquired as to the cause of the haste, he said that strong pressure had been brought to bear on him for immediate action in replacing me on the commission.

"When I inquired the source of the 'strong pressure' he declined to give it over the telephone. It would be interesting, at least, to learn the source of this pressure.

"On the day the governor determined upon my removal, this friend on the commission was in Salem, and in conference with the governor. Also, previous to my raising any question as to the part played by this friend of the governor, he had been protesting his innocence of any knowledge or part in the affair. On Sunday he had Frank Fawk of Rickreall drive to Portland in order that his innocence might be broadcast to me, and to urge Mr. Fawk, as a friend of mine, to impudently me not to make any public statement.

"The governor said the cause of my removal was the statute which permits a citizen to hold but one lucrative position under the state. I did not expect to draw any compensation for my services as commissioner, and so told the governor. Legal counsel has advised me that I could remain in the office of state superintendent of public instruction, if I accepted no compensation for my services as textbook commissioner.

"I, in any event, the reason the governor gave for my dismissal was just as pertinent four months ago when he appointed me state superintendent of schools as it is today. I would not see the reason of his wanting more than four months and taking no action in the premise, and then to seize upon a time when I was in a distant part of the state to accomplish my removal from the commission.

"Apparently the move was made to injure me in my candid-

any before the electorate of the state at this time as a punishment for my refusing to be controlled by the governor's friend on the commission. It is the adoption of August, 1925, I had done other than I did. It would have been at the sacrifice of the welfare of the schools of the state and at an immense cost to the parents."

GIGANTIC ROSE DIAMOND LOOT OF DARING THIEVES

dional museums of France.

daring band of thieves, consisting of at least four men, scaled the high walls of the castle grounds with the aid of two ladders, crossed a moat and climbed up to the famous "room of gems" from which they looted precious stones and historical ornaments. The intrinsic value of the objects stolen has been placed as high as 100,000,000 francs while their value as relics of a by-gone age are beyond calculation.

Besides the rose diamond, the thieves took two gorgeous diamonds studded daggers, one of which belonged to Abd-el-Kader and the other to the Bey of Tunis; a cross of the Legion of Honor which Napoleon I. gave to General Aymard in 1809; several bracelets, one bearing the portrait of the queen of the Belgians by a famous artist and the other bearing a cameo of Francis I., emperor of Austria; and several watches and decorated candy boxes, most of them the work of celebrated artists of the seventeenth and eighteenth centuries.

The rose diamond, a heart shaped stone almost an inch long and more than a half inch wide, was once owned by the celebrated French general, Prince De Conde, Louis II. of Bourbon, known as the "grande Conde" who defeated the Spaniards in 1643 at the battle of Rocroi. The diamond remained in the Conde family until 1830 until it was bequeathed to the Duc d'Aumale.

Footprints and fingerprints revealed that at least four members were in the band and also enabled the police to gain a fair idea of how the thieves went about the robbery. The robbers brought one ladder with them and picked up another on the castle grounds. The "room of gems," which is in the gem tower, is on an island and has a separate bridge over a moat. This bridge had been drawn up for the night and the intruders used a 40 foot ladder to cross the moat.

Climbing up to the second story to a tower where the gems were kept, the thieves smashed a lead plate glass in one of the windows and entered the "room of gems." They broke the glass lids of three showcases, from which they removed the diamond and other articles. In their haste, they passed over many masterpieces, one an enamel painting by Benvenuto Cellini of incalculable value.

The intruders apparently did not visit the other rooms of the chateau where hang more than 500 paintings and hundreds of
