SANTIAM MINE VALUES REVEALED BY EXPERTS (Continued from page 1.)

The north side of the Little North Fork of the Santiam river. This shaft may go down 500 feet or more. The examination shows 4.37 per cent copper, some silver and some gold in this tunnel, over a space 120 feet long by six feet wide.

Very Rich Ore

At the point where the shaft is to be sunk, however, there is a showing of 25 per cent copper ore, besides 4 to 5 ounces of silver and \$4 to the ton of gold. It is believed that this shaft will discover ore rich enough to be shipped by trucks to the railroad and taken to the Tacoma smelter, without reducing it, storing it in spring, when the roads will be in condition for trucking. That will be one of the objectives of the initial operation of the mine. The examination of the mining properties showed some ore that ran almost 90 per cent copper; the next thing to sheet (or pure) copper. The mining men have a name for this ore, or two names but the reporter got his wires crossed and did not get them with sufficient accuracy to venture in using the names.

One thing, Mr. Elmendorf said the properties he examined

showed the cleanest sulphide ore he had ever found in any mining region, and this includes some of the best of them, including the Rocky mountain mining regions.

He also said that, under the proper management, these mines can be made one of the biggest paying properties in the United States.

Good Showings Elsewhere

In the Northwest tunnel on the south side of the river there was found an ore chute 110 feet long that goes over 3 per cent copper, an ounce and a half to the ton of silver, and some gold. This is five feet wide.

Another ore chute 190 feet long and five feet wide went 2.58 per cent copper, one ounce to the ton of silver and some gold. At the breast of the tunnel a sample cut clear across, measuring seven feet, showed 4.57 per cent copper and some silver. In a 10 inch streak 7.75 per cent copper ore was found. In storing the ore from the breast of this tunnel, and taking grab samples, some ore was found assaying 8.28 per cent copper.

From Federal Bureau

Wm. M. Romischer, of the United States bureau of mines, was on the grounds for nearly two months of the time the examinations were being made, and he did the assaying and supervised the sampling during that time. R. E. Davis of Salem and Geo. F. Buzza of Portland were the men who did the sampling. They took channel samples across the floor, taken at intervals of 10 feet.

After It Was Over

After Mr. Elmendorf looked over the whole property, including the surrounding country, when he had completed the examination, he made this comment:

"Any mine that has as good a showing as this is not to be sneezed at in any man's country."

That is saying a lot for him, for he has a reputation to protect. He does not take snap judgments. He would say nothing till he had completed his examination, and had made it inclusive, and thorough. He put his o. k. on every phase of the mine, as giving promise of big things under proper direction.

Will Carry On

Pat Tallon, a mining man with a long and wide experience, has charge of the underground work at the mine, under the general direction of Mr. Elmendorf.

The men who assisted in the examination were thoroughly worked up to a high pitch of excitement, as they began to see the values they were uncovering. They worked over time, repeatedly, without pay, when they were near to something especially good in value.

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It was said that the court would prepare a written opinion in the case later this week.
