SECRETARY OF 'Y' SPEAKS ON EUROPE

Harry W. Stone Tells Rotary Club of Trip to YMCA Conference

If any trouble breaks out soon in Europe, Mussolini will be behind it, according to the belief of most people there, Harry W. Stone, Portland YMCA secretary, who has just returned from a four months trip to Europe, told the Salem Rotary club Wednesday noon.

Mr. Stone was a member of a party that traveled to the world YMCA conference in Helsinki, Finland, and also visited most of the principal European countries, conferring with the political, industrial and religious leaders.

Italy is increasing its army while the other nations in Europe are reducing theirs, Mr. Stone said, and Mussolini continually reminds his people of the greatness of Rome. Besides this, there is a continual increase of population in already overcrowded Italy.

There is more prosperity and safety in Italy than in most of Europe, Mr. Stone said, but it was bought at a fearful price. There is no liberty of the press of speech or of assembly. Mussolini is absolute dictator.

The first country Mr. Stone visited in Europe was France. The educational system in that country is just as Napoleon left it, he said. There are only seven universities and college presidents get about \$160 or \$170 a year salary.

"Labor expects to get control of English politics some day," he continued in discussing Britain, "and while I do not believe in most of their policies, I admire the labor leaders. Most of them are unconfident ministers and teachers."

"All the big industries there have been losing money for the last five years. There are about one and one-half or three million unemployed."

Unless there are new ideas in Europe, more wars will come, he said. There is hate between practically all neighboring countries.
