

### SPEC KEENE TUNES TEAM FOR PACIFIC

Offensive Power Needed Badly, Injuries Keep Players on Sidelines

Definite arrangements have been completed for a football game to be played between Willamette university and Multnomah club of Portland on the Willamette field Saturday, October 23, at 2:30 o'clock. Negotiations for the game have been under way for considerable time, but terms were not decided until yesterday afternoon.

The Multnomah club will bring a much stronger team than the one that lost to OAC recently by an overwhelming score. Several new players have been added, all ex-college stars, so that the club now presents a formidable machine.

This will be the first chance for Willamette to show if it has any offensive power, according to Coach Spec Keene. The Oregon and Washington games were too one-sided for the Beavers to have a chance.

This game will also give Coach Keene the first good opportunity to determine the relative merits of his players in a real game. He can thus pick his first team line-up for the Pacific game the following week.

The spirit of his men is causing Keene considerable worry. They go through their plays in a mechanical and listless way, showing little apparent interest in whether they ever win a game or not. Whether this is the result of getting them "keyed up" too early in the season for their two big games or whether they have the attitude naturally is the question.

"The men need about 30 per cent more fire than they have now," said Coach Keene. "I can't figure out what's the matter with them. They had plenty of rest after the Washington game. They showed a little more scrap in practice last night, but are still far from having the spirit they should have."

The squad is still handicapped with about a dozen men on the hospital list, but the biggest part of these are expected to be back in the lineup in time for the game with Pacific university, October 30th.

Reidel, a lineman, who was thought to be out for the season because of an operation, will be able to play if he is careful, his physician has said. He will be a welcome addition to the squad because of his ability to throw passes.

Harry Cloninger, halfback, will be out until some time next week because of an injury.

Negotiations to get a game for Saturday have been unsuccessful, so Coach Keene plans to hold a scrimmage between two teams, one composed of the second team line and first team backfield, and the other of the first team line and second team backfield.

### INJURIES WEAKEN LOCAL GRID TEAM

A squad of 18 Salem high school football players will leave this afternoon for Astoria where they will meet Astoria high school Saturday afternoon. The men will be accompanied by Coach Hollis Huntington and by Dwight Adams, manager.

The team will be sorely handicapped, as A. Lyons, quarterback and one of the main offensive threats in the backfield, was announced yesterday afternoon to be ineligible because of his grades. Lyons is a veteran from last year, when he won the title of all-state quarterback.

Hubert Ashby, second string quarterback, will start the game in the signal-barking position. Ashby has done well in recent practice sessions, and is held to be the equal of most high school quarterbacks.

Bocke, fullback, is suffering from an injured ankle received in the Benson game last Saturday, and he may not be able to last out the game. Cummings, who is slated as an end, started the season as a fullback, and will be able to step in Bocke's place if he weakens.

Little is known here about the Astoria team this year, but as that school always turns out one of the

best grid machines in the state, a stiff battle is believed to await Huntington's men. The Salem team showed improved form last week against Benson over what it did earlier in the season, and if it has continued to improve in the last week it should give a good account of itself.

The starting lineup is expected to include Olinger and Adams, ends; Lyons and Tibble, tackles; Drager and East, guards; Peterson, center; Ashby, quarter; Kelly and Temple, halves, and Bocke, full. Other men who will make the trip include Nelson, full; Cummings, end; Hamilton, end; Iobby, guard; Fabry, guard; Jones, tackle, and Bowne, tackle.

**SHEEP BAN IS ORDERED**  
RULING EFFECTIVE OCTOBER 15, SAY OFFICIALS

Governor Pierce yesterday issued an order establishing a quarantine against the shipment into Oregon of sheep from Wyoming, Washington and California unless they are certified by inspectors of the federal bureau of animal husbandry as originating in territory free from sheep scab infection.

Bucks must have been dipped at least once unless it is otherwise ordered by officials. Quarantine will be effective on October 15.

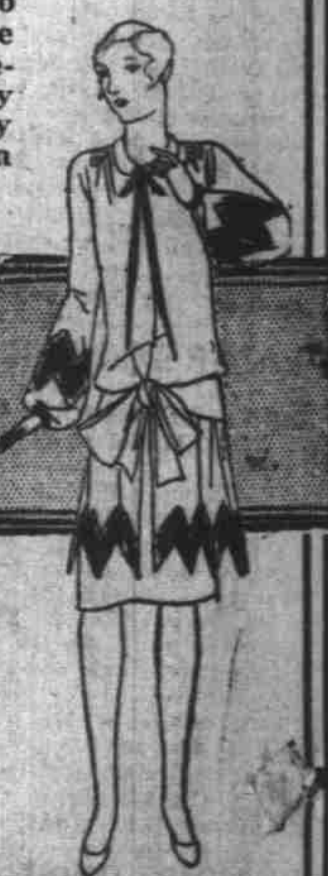
