TWO ENOUGH, THREE A-PLENTY

There are proposals on the November ballot for two more normal schools, one at some point in eastern Oregon, and the other at Seaside.

Oregon has a new normal school at Ashland, authorized by the legislature at its last session. It is not interfering with the attendance of the normal school at Monmouth, which, however, is operating at a disadvantage due to its small appropriation.

There are sound arguments in favor of a third normal school in eastern Oregon, and one should be established, if the state can afford it—

And can at the same time afford to provide for the actual needs at Monmouth and Ashland.

But there is no good argument for still another one at Seaside, and certainly the state cannot at this time afford to take on such a burden; the burden of both building and providing the funds to operate a fourth normal school at a point

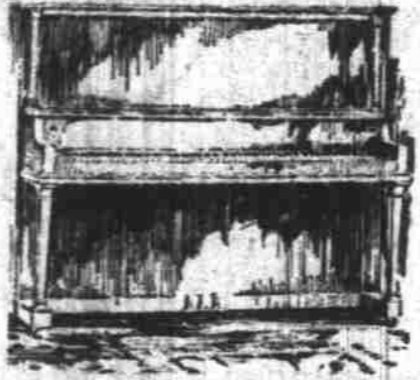
where there is no especial urgent need for one at this time. Also, there is on the ballot a proposal for a tuberculosis hospital in eastern Oregon. It should be voted down. The time may come, with increased population, when a second institution for tubercular patients ought to be provided—and in that case it should be in eastern Oregon. But the need now is for increased facilities at the one already established.
