### MERITS OF BUS AND TRUCK LAW STUDIED

Commission Cannot Supply Estimated Revenue on Two Bills at Present

Representatives of the City club of Portland conferred with mem-

bers of the public service commission here yesterday with relation to the relative merits of house bill No. 413, enacted at the last session of the legislature and now under referendum attack, and an initiative measure sponsored by the bus and truck operators of the state.

Both bills have for their purpose the regulation of motor buses and trucks operating as common carriers on the highways of the state. The City club representatives especially were desir-

ous of obtaining information as to the estimated revenues of the two bills and the administration costs. Members of the commission said they were unable to supply this information in that the revenues would depend entirely upon the amount of business handled and the outcome of a case now pending in the courts as to what constitutes a common carrier under the state transportation act.

During the last session of the legislature it was estimated that house bill No. 413 would return

to the state between \$250,000 and \$400,000 annually.

Bus and truck operators have contended that the initiative bill would net the state more revenue than would be raised under house bill No. 413 in that the cost of administration would be far less.
