

PELZ WINS FAST FIGHT FROM BAYES

Opening Fistic Card at Armory Attracts Large Crowd of Well Pleased Fans

After 19 rounds of fast and furious battling in the main event last night, referee Tom Louttit raised Benny Pelz' hand to indicate that he had captured the hard-won decision from Phil Bayes, Salem battler. Bayes showed plenty of stuff so that Benny had to show everything he had to win. The battle was so close, in fact, that many fans booed the decision, believing Phil should have had a draw.

A close analysis of each round, however, bears out the decision as Pelz took four to two for Bayes. The other four rounds were even.

The two fighters contested themselves with sparring in the first round, looking for an opening so that it was an even round. Bayes started out in the second and led the fighting, landing several rights and lefts to the face. He continued the work in the third round, winning both by a fair margin.

As the third round ended Pelz apparently believed that he had been hit low, as he was wandering around the ring making motions at the referee at the bell. The belief that he had been fouled apparently angered him, and the imputation that he had fouled Pelz apparently made Phil a little bit peeved on his own part, as the two boys started out and from then on slugged away at each other in what everybody agreed

to be the best fight seen around here in a long time.

Phil rushed the fight along, and managed to land a large number of punches, although Pelz took many on his glove that apparently landed when seen from a distance.

The fourth and fifth rounds were fast and furious, both men throwing caution to the winds and opening up with all they had. Pelz won the fourth round, but Phil hit him several hard wallops at the start of the fifth. As the round ended Pelz opened up with a barrage of pile driver wallops, sending Phil against the ropes as the round ended.

Both boys stood up and pounded each other in the sixth and seventh rounds. There was plenty of speed and action, and each fighter took plenty of blows. Both these rounds were even.

The eighth came opened with a burst of speed and action. Blows rained from all angles thick and fast. Pelz got started on the last part of this round and pounded Phil hard and often on both the face and body, so that Bayes appeared groggy as he went to his corner.

He came back in the ninth and made a battle of it the rest of the way, although the punishment he had been receiving apparently slowed him up slightly. He would frequently rush into a clinch and hang on. As the 10th round ended, Phil made a desperate rally that almost earned him a draw decision, but it was a little too late to prevent the victory going to Pelz.

Although Bayes lost the decision Salem fight fans' opinion of his ability was considerably strengthened, as he made the best showing he has in a long time. He fought like a demon all the way, al-

though he took punishment that would have silenced many a boxer. He gave Pelz all the fight he wanted through the whole ten rounds.

Eddie Moore of Portland won a somewhat fluke knockout from Norman Snell, also of Portland, in the fifth round of what was scheduled to be a six-round semi-final event. The fight was fairly even for the first four rounds, and Snell had the edge if there was any.

He went down in the fifth, however, apparently to claim a foul, and knelt there while the referee counted him out. Apparently he was not hard hit, and was far from being clear out.

Billy Bardette of Portland and Russell Greene of Salem battled four rounds to a draw. It was a fast fight all the way. Greene was up against a tough battler, but managed to hold his own successfully.

Kid Obregon of Portland made short work of his bout with Jimmy Fargo of Salem, the local boy being laid out cold before the first round had fairly started. Obregon was quick and carried a lightning punch, knocking Fargo out with a sizzling right uppercut at close range before Fargo had time to know he was in a fight.

Young Watt of Salem and Pete Dogerhide, also of Salem, slugged each other through four fast rounds to a draw in the curtain raiser. Neither of the boys appeared to know much about the fighting game, but they were willing fighters and half boxed and half wrestled each other with much energy, if not skill.

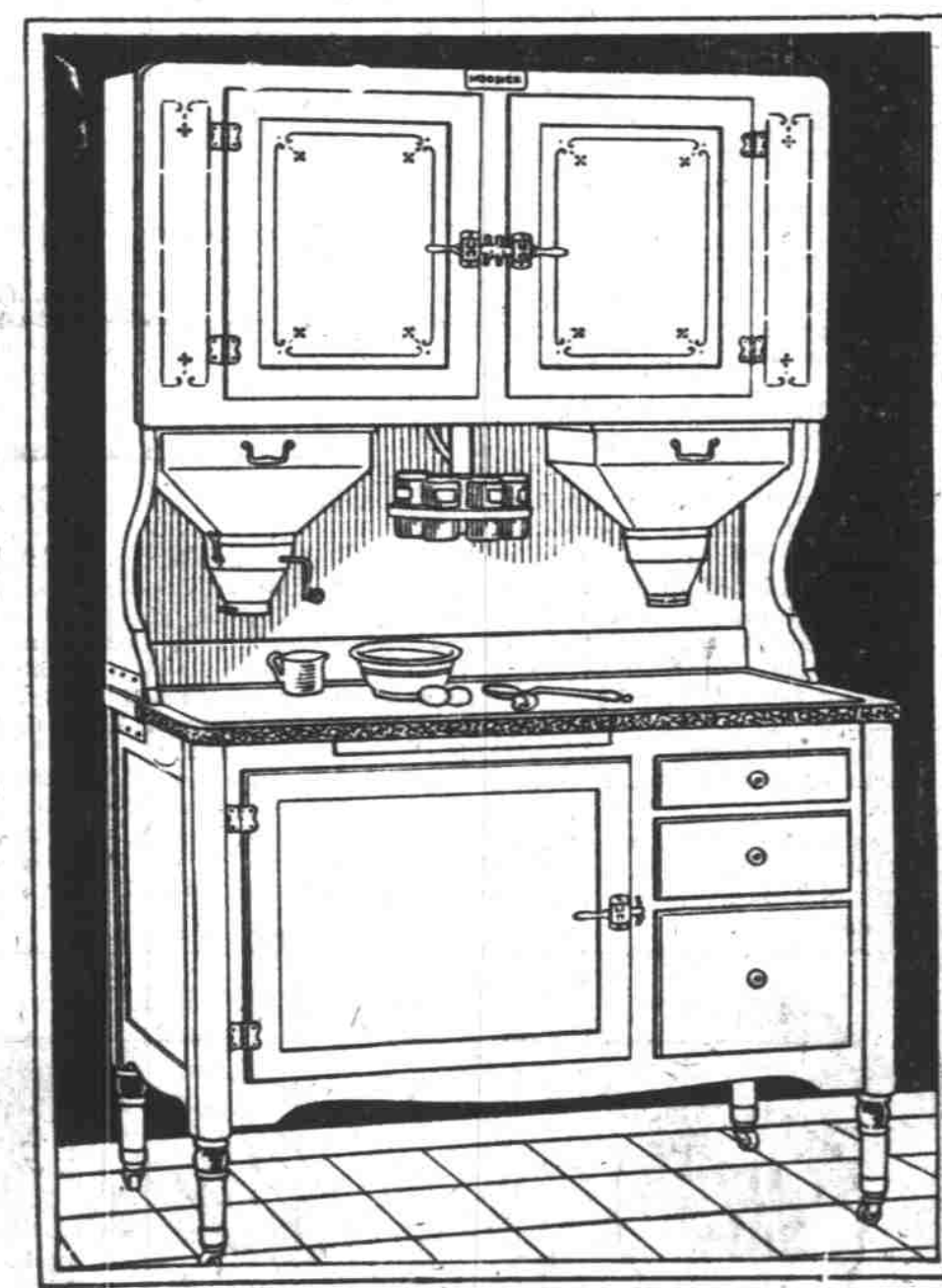
