That women are interested in affairs of government was demonstrated at a meeting Tuesday held at the home of Mrs. R. K. Ohling, when the Salem Etokta club was hostess to the Salem League of Women Voters. Mrs. Rex Sanford, president of the league, presided and spoke briefly of the history and principles of the league.

When 20 million women became voting citizens there was a vital need of an organization for the political education of these new voters. The league believes that instruction in the duties of citizenship and the principles and machinery of government will eventually become a part of our educational system. Until such time as this need is recognized, the work must be carried on by private agencies.
