A feature in the baby booth will be the complete layette which will be placed on sale.

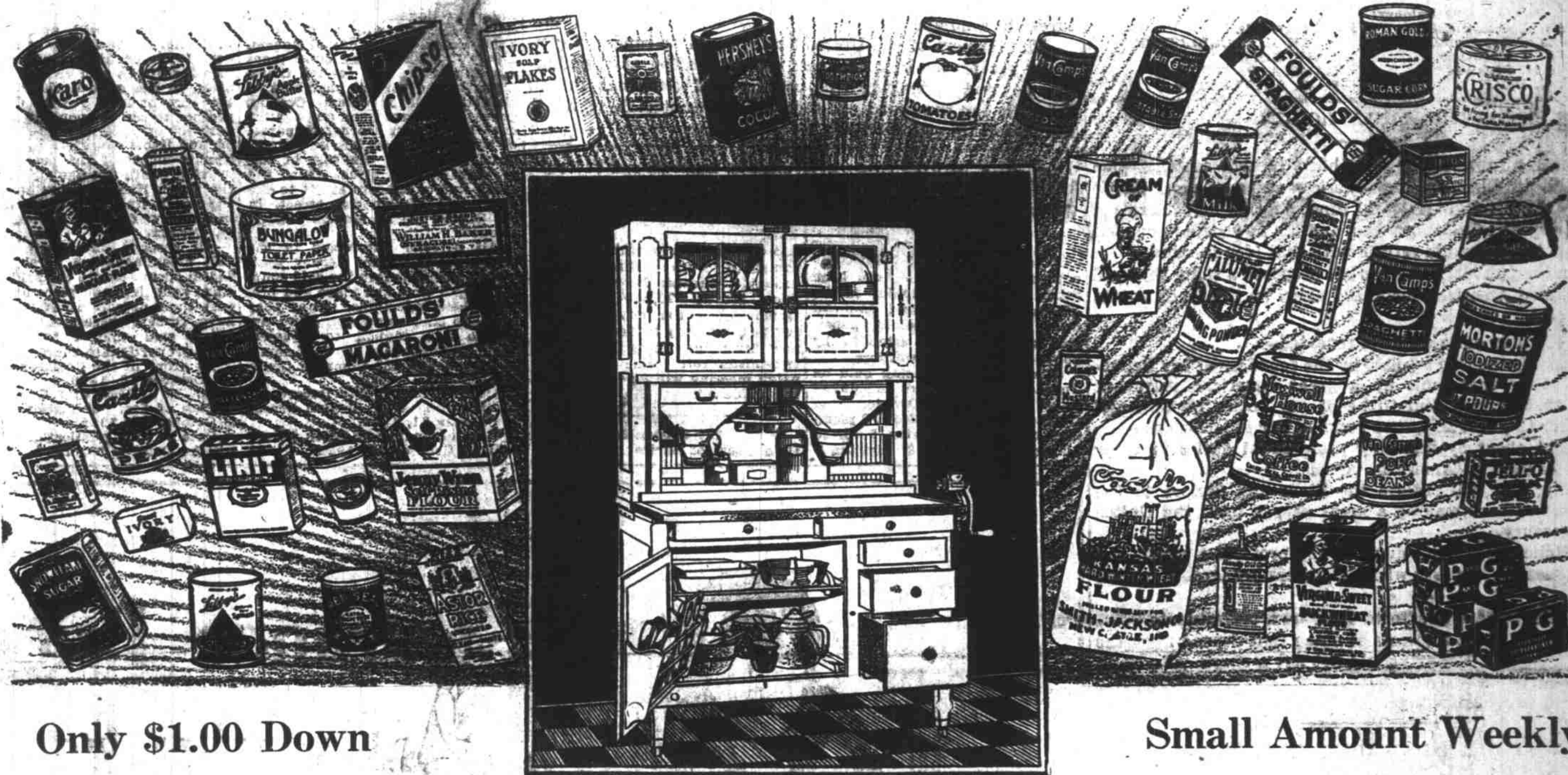
House Guests at Goltra Home
