

AGGIES PREPARE FOR IDAHO GAME

Vandals Expected to Use Entire First String Against OAC Machine

OREGON AGRICULTURAL COLLEGE, Corvallis, Ore., Oct. 27.—(Special).—The Oregon Aggie eleven rested on its laurels over the week-end in a tie with USC for leadership in the coast conference. The Aggies are preparing for the game with the University of Idaho in Portland Saturday afternoon which comes the crucial contest with Southern California on Armistice Day.

Idaho has not appeared very formidable as yet this season, but she has been playing for the most part with from five to seven of her first string players on the bench. For the first time this year Coach Charles Erb expects to start his entire first string lineup when his proteges meet Scholastic's Oregon state machine. Idaho has won two, lost one and tied on game this year. The University of Washington blighted the conference hopes of the Vandals by turning them back, 26 to 0. Montana and the College of Idaho fell before the Gem Staters but Montana State held them to a scoreless tie.

With all regulars, with the possible exception of Frank Powers, quarterback, in uniform Saturday, the Vandals will be dangerous opponents for the Oregon Staters. Coach Erb has shifted Darwin Burgher, 195 pound half-back, to end. This solves a big problem in the Idaho offense and defense. Burgher played end with the 1925 freshman squad. The Idaho men are even heavier than their big Orange and Black opponents.

OAC and Idaho have clashed eight times since 1913. The Orange tidal wave has rolled up six victories to two for Idaho in this time for a total of 137 points to 42.

Idaho backers are not conceding their team much of a chance to win, but are intimating that the Orange and Black squad will have an interesting 60 minutes.

OAC is now the second highest scoring machine on the Pacific coast, with a total of 166 points garnered to 13 for opponents. Southern California ranks first with 187 to 13 for opponents. The Trojans, however, have played one more game than the Aggies. Each team has chalked up two conference wins and no defeats.

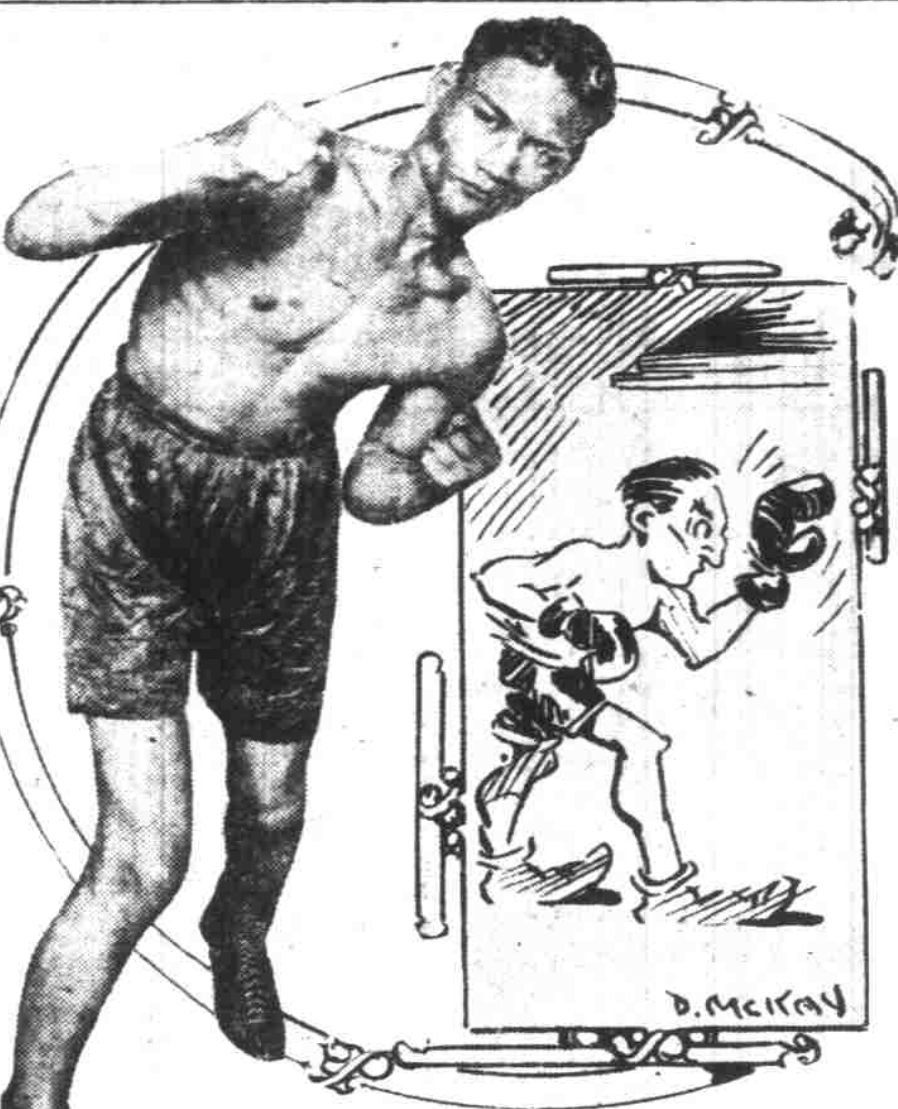

FOOTBALL ELEVEN READY FOR DRIVE

Coast Conference Teams Speed Up Practice for Saturday Game

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 27.—(AP).—Football eleven of the Pacific coast conference, having passed the half way sensational mark, are speeding up this week for a slashing drive across the finish line.

Stanford and the University of Southern California, undefeated in the seasonal battle, are making feverish preparations for their test at Los Angeles next Saturday—the result of which will virtually eliminate one from the race for honors. The Trojans, with two impressive conference victories, are favored to keep an unblemished slate against the slow-starting Stanford Cardinals.

The Oregon Aggies, third undefeated conference eleven, are expected to have an easy time with Idaho in their clash at Portland and present intensive workouts are being directed more toward the November 11 fracas with Southern California than the game Saturday.

California's Golden Bears are being whipped into shape, as far as a heavy list of discouraging injuries will permit, for the remaining conference on this week-end's schedule. Oregon, also twice defeated, will furnish opposition for the Bears.

Washington, which lost its first conference game in a year and a half last week to Washington State College, takes on Whitman College at Walla Walla. The contest has no conference bearing.

DEMPEY TO TRAIN FOR TITLE CHANCE

Ex-Champion Intimates the Next Few Months Will Decide Issue

NEW YORK, Oct. 27.—(AP).—Jack Dempsey today told Tex Rickard he would make no immediate come-back in the ring.

The dethroned champion said that next week he would return to his home in California, where he will go into training for two months.

"If I find I haven't gone back too far to give a suitable account of myself, I will attempt to regain the title," Rickard quoted Dempsey as saying.

The former titanoir, Mrs. Dempsey and Rickard discussed the possibility of Dempsey's comeback this afternoon. They also discussed possible opponents.

"But nothing definite was decided upon," said Rickard. Dempsey wants to be sure he is "right" before he goes ahead with a match and if he does fight again, he probably will not be seen in the ring before February at the earliest.

Rickard admitted, however, that he expected to confer again with Dempsey in a few days. "Dempsey is still a young man," he said, "but he may decide that he has made enough out of the game to quit."

Rickard said that Jack Sharkey and Jim Maloney, of Boston, and Harry Persson, the Swedish heavyweight, were among prospective opponents he discussed with Dempsey. The name of Paul Berlenbach, former light heavyweight titleholder, who has been eager to fight Dempsey, was not brought up. Rickard indicated that he considered Berlenbach was not big enough to make a good match against the former champion.

"I probably will not hear from Dempsey until December," said Rickard. "He is going to give himself a thorough test. When he says the word, I will sign a suitable opponent."
