

SALEM HI MEETS CORVALLIS TODAY

Visitors Bring Exceptionally
Strong Team, Local De-
termined to Win

Coach Hollis Huntington's Salem high school football machine is all oiled and greased, ready to begin its offensive against the Corvallis high school eleven this afternoon at 2 o'clock on Sweetland field. The men went through a light signal practice yesterday afternoon preparatory to taking the field.

One of the toughest battles of the season is expected by Coach Huntington, who is not very confident of victory. There are no comparative scores to date on the result of the game by, but the invaders have a powerful offensive attack, both aerial and through the line.

The Corvallis offensive is built around Lloyd Miller and Chas. Smith, triple-threat halfbacks, who are considered the best kickers in Willamette valley high school circles, and who can also pass and carry the ball effectively.

To help this backfield, the invaders have a strong line, which outweighs the local team's line. They came to naught. Persons believed to have knowledge of the mysterious killings were found dead, one in what was made to appear a train accident.

Wiggins danced through the first four rounds and when Loughran opened up on him with body wallops, Wiggins committed the fee.

NEW YORK, Oct. 29.—Ace Hudkins, the Nebraska Wildcat, carried off the judge's decision over Phil McGraw tonight in a spectacular 12-round slugfest featuring the boxing show at Madison Square Garden before a crowd of 18,000. It was a return match with Hudkins repeating his victory.

Sid Barbarian of Detroit and Tommy Farley of Philadelphia battled to a sensational 10-round draw tonight at the garden. Barbarian was the aggressor, and to ringside observers appeared to have an edge at the finish after pummeling Farley badly in the closing rounds, offsetting the latter's early advantage in the early half of the fight. Barbarian was three pounds lighter than Farley, who weighed 137½ pounds.

Promising a surprise for the Aggies, the versatile Vandals are said to possess a deceptive attack which their followers indicate will be unleashed upon the Oregon roughriders tomorrow. Charley Erb, head coach of the Idaho team, is noncommittal about his team's chances, and George Philbrook, line coach, is almost as reticent. They agree, however, that as Idaho has won one game and suffered one defeat, they firmly decline to be read out of the party. A game of the most spectacular

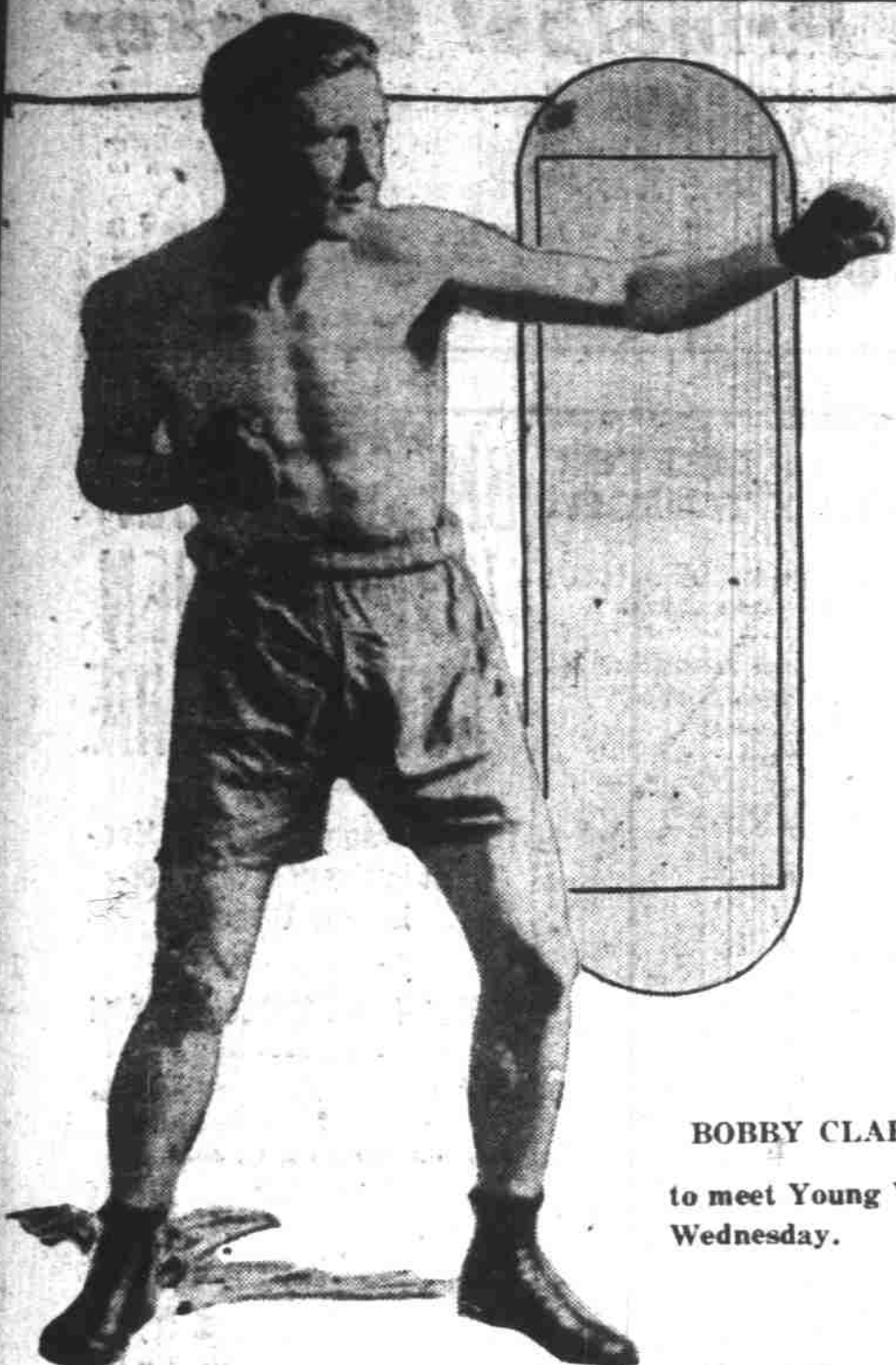
description, as both teams are thoroughly grounded in fundamentals, and each relies for ground gaining on speed, deception and open field running is promised.

PORTLAND, Oct. 29.—(AP)—The cube butter demand was active and extras advanced one cent to 41½c at the dairy exchange. Other grades were unchanged. Receipts were 6,641 pounds; production 13,453 pounds, and withdrawals 2,360 pounds.

No changes were made in the egg list. Arrivals were larger at 1267 cases and 619 cases were taken out of storage.

ance which he carried on the Indian's life. The jury imposed life sentences.

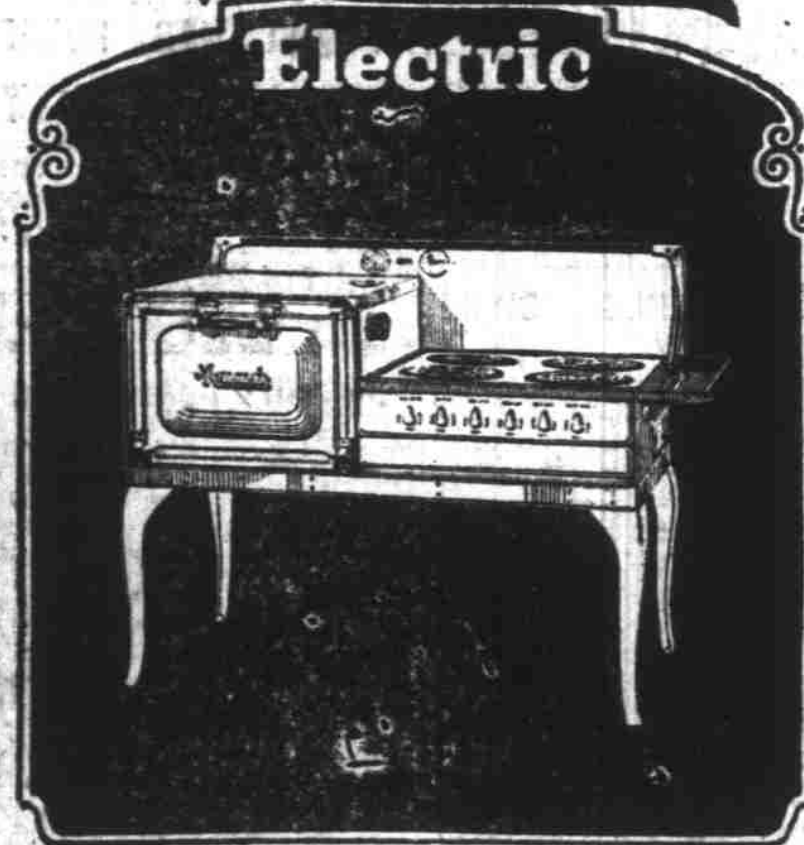
Nearly a score of persons met violent deaths in the Osage country in 1922 and 1923. As death followed death, the Osages, the

The result is that they receive enough votes from the two groups to put over their appropriations. Oregon senators are both republican. They can't reach the democrats.

Every western state except Oregon has a bipartisan congressional delegation or else extreme progressives like Borah and Johnson, who are far from regular. They get things. Oregon is ignored.

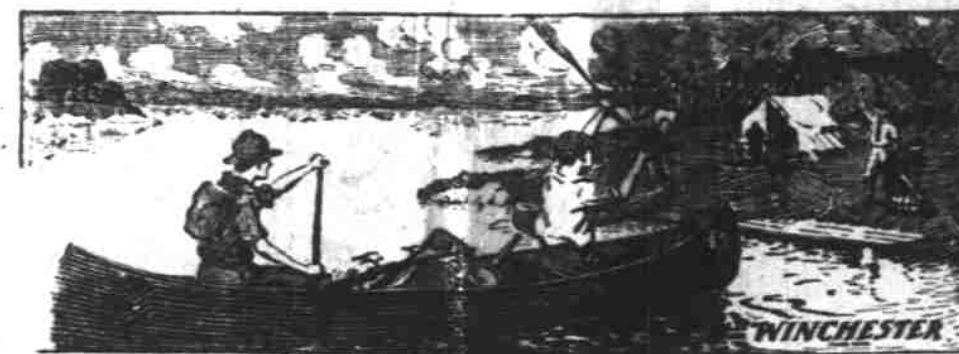
