

# Trojan Eleven Outsmarts Beavers

## MORTON KAER STAR OF MUDDY CONTEST

### Dixon, Giant Beaver Tackle, Blocks USC Punt on 20 Yard Line

PORTLAND, Nov. 11.—(AP)—Despite a muddy, slow field, which was supposed to be an advantage to the Oregon Aggies, a speedy and alert University of Southern California eleven outran and outsmarted their more powerful, but lethargic opponents at Multnomah stadium today and won a fiercely contested football game, 17 to 7.

Morton Kaer, little and strong as a jungle tiger, speedy and graceful as an antelope and as deceptive as a chameleon, boiled a trail of steaming ooze in his fleet footed wake throughout a thrilling afternoon of the great American gridiron sport. Kaer made one of his team's touchdowns and directed the Trojan play with the masterful touch of a born field marshal.

Bruce Taylor accounted for the other Trojan score when he placed a ball between the bars from the 21 yard line in the first quarter after having missed two other place kicking attempts.

The Aggies made their only score with 30 seconds to go in the last quarter when Jim Dixon giant tackle, blocked Elliott's punt on the Trojan 20 yard line and Ohlstead, substitute tackle for the Aggies, picked up the bouncing ball and dived over the line from the eight yard marker, Maple place kicking the extra point.

The Aggies kicked off to start the game and after the ball had been brought out from behind the Trojan goal line to the 20 yard line Kaer tried two or three plays without success and then punted, Jarvis for the Aggies fumbled on the first ensuing play. Badger recovered on the Trojan's 27 yard line. Kaer dazed the Oregonian with a slippery smidish off tackle and reversing for a gain of 26 yards. The Trojans had the ball then on the Aggie nine yard line, but lost it on a fumble. The Aggies punted to midfield and Kaer and Larameta plunged it back to the 25 yard mark, where after two ineffectual attempts on the Orange line, Kaer called for the first place kick, which Taylor missed.

Twice again the Aggies punted on first down and the Trojans brought the ball back from midfield to within striking distance, Taylor being called upon for a place kick each time. On the third try the Aggie line drove his left toe into the leather and this time the ball sailed straight and true over the bar from the 21 yard line.

After a series of punt exchanges in the second quarter, with Kaer gaining steadily on Liebe in this kicking duel, the Trojans started a drive from the 45 yard line, with Kaer making nearly all the yardage on off tackle thrusts. The Aggies stiffened and threw Larameta twice for a loss. Then Kaer signalled for an end run and

fainting as though for a dash around the Orange right flank, he stopped suddenly and lobbed the ball through the center of the line to Larameta who caught it over the Aggie goal with no opposing player near him. The ball was on the 11 yard marker when this play started. Taylor kicked the try-for-point, making the score 10 to 0. The score stayed that way till the end of the first half.

The Aggies started a real drive through the air late in the third quarter. Liebe, Aggie guard intercepted a pass by Kaer near midfield. Maple was tackled for a 10 yard loss by Badger a play or two later. Then Schumierich dropped back and faked a place kick. He threw a beautiful pass to Denman who gained 25 yards and ran outside on the Trojan 15 yard line, but the advance was nullified when the head linesman called an off side penalty on the Orangemen, the first penalty of the day. Kaer shortly afterwards intercepted another pass from Schumierich following another advance through the clouds by the Aggies and that ended what looked like a winning onslaught for the Oregonians.

The Trojans got the ball early in the last quarter on a punt to within the shadow of their own goal line. Kaer instead of returning the punt immediately crossed the opposing team by sending a play around their right end for a 15 yard gain. Kaer and Larameta then started a march which carried them up the field, Kaer making nearly 60 yards on terrific plunging cut backs off tackle and finally crushing through on a plain old fashioned buck of two yards through left tackle for a touchdown. Taylor kicked the extra point.

## SALEM HIGH DEFEATS EUGENE MEN HERE

of the offensive work in the backfield.

Salem's first score came in the first few minutes of play: A Eugene back fumbled soon after the kickoff, Cummings recovering on the Eugene 35. Two attempts through the line failed to gain, so on the third play Temple threw a 20 yard pass to Cummings over the whole Eugene team, Cummings running the remaining 10 yards to the goal. Temple failed to convert.

O'Connor made a first down for Eugene soon after receiving the next kickoff, tearing off a 12 yard gain through left tackle. A 15 yard pass, O'Connor to Colbert, brought another first down on the Salem 40. The Salem line held, and Manerud punted to the Salem 10.

Temple's punt was blocked, but Kelly recovered for Salem. Temple punted out of bounds on the Salem 30. O'Connor plunged through a wide hole in left tackle, twisting his way to the Salem 10. Four plunges through the line failed to gain the needed yardage, and Salem obtained the ball on her five yard line.

The Eugene line broke through and blocked Temple's punt, the ball bounced back over the goal line, where Colbert fell on it for a touchdown. Bissoneite missed the goal.

The first period ended as Colbert recovered a Salem fumble on the Salem 35.

O'Connor plunged through the center of the line and twisted his way for 20 yards before being downed by the safety player of the Salem 10.

Riley and O'Connor punched at the line, but failed to gain. On third down O'Connor passed over the goal line, but the ball was grounded.

Salem gained the ball on her 20 yard line, and lost about 10 yards attempting to run with the ball. Temple punted out of bounds on the Salem 30. A 15 yard penalty on Salem for holding again brought the ball under the shadow of the Salem goal posts.

O'Connor in two plays carried the ball to the 10 yard line. He attempted to dropkick on the next play, but it went wide.

## RAY SCHALK WILL HEAD WHITE SOX

### Player Lauded by President as He Makes Appointment as Pilot

CHICAGO, Nov. 11.—(AP)—Ray Schalk, veteran catcher of the American League tonight was appointed manager of the Chicago White Sox by President Charles A. Comiskey. Schalk succeeds Eddie Collins, who piloted the club for two seasons.

Collins, who came to the White Sox from the Philadelphia Athletics 11 years ago where he was a member of the famous \$100,000 infield, probably will be given his unconditional release. Waivers already have been asked on the former Keystone king.

"Schalk always gave the game his best efforts and has been one of the hardest workers on the club, and I feel that he is entitled to the chance of leading the club which he has served so well," President Comiskey said in making the appointment.

Talk on the baseball field tonight was current that Collins probably would return to the Athletics where he started his major league career and serve as pilot, while it was also said that he might become leader of the Boston Red Sox.

Temple punted back to the Salem 40; Eugene was soon forced to kick again, and this time the Salem line broke through and blocked Manerud's effort, a Salem man recovering.

Three Salem passes were incomplete, however, and another exchange of punts followed. Salem again tried to gain and failed Temple punting to Reubenstein of the Eugene 40.

The ball was too slippery for the little Eugene safety to handle and it bounced from his waiting hands to the ground, where Draeger, charging through the line, picked it up without losing his stride and galloped unimpeded 40 yards across the goal line. Temple failed to convert, making the score 19 to 6 for Salem.

The ball was in Salem's possession in midfield when final period opened. Temple made 20 yards around left end, and soon after was forced to punt. His attempt was blocked, Eugene recovering the ball after it had rolled back to the 50 yard line.

A pass, Manerud to Riley, gained 8 yards. Riley plunged 8 more through the line for a first down on the Salem 30.

Manerud attempted a pass that was intercepted on the Salem 20, but a Salem back fumbled on the first play. Pitman recovering for Eugene. The purple and white machine again continued rolling toward the goal, fighting desperately for a touchdown.

O'Connor made four yards through the line. Manerud added one more, carrying the ball out of bounds. Manerud slipped through the Salem line and snared a pass from O'Connor that added 10 more yards, Manerud being downed on the Salem 5.

Riley made two yards through left tackle. Riley hit the same hole for no gain. O'Connor plunged over the line for one more, the ball being on Salem's one yard line.

Riley bucked center on fourth down, pushing through a mob of tacklers to the goal line. Manerud's try for point was blocked, making the score 19 to 12 for Salem.

If remained there during the remaining five minutes of play, although the Eugene team fought desperately to add another touchdown that might tie the score. The game ended as O'Connor hurled a last futile pass.

Many rooters in the grandstand showed poor sportsmanship by booing frequently at the officials and at the Eugene team.
