**ANDREWS FAVORS  
NEW DISTILLERY**

**IMPERATIVE THAT MEDICINAL LIQUOR BE MADE**

**Congress to Be Asked to Enact Legislation for Private Corporation**

WASHINGTON, Nov. 20.—(AP)—Immediate creation of a private corporation to manufacture medicinal whiskey and to take over all existing supplies of this liquor will be asked of congress by General Lincoln C. Andrews, in charge of prohibition enforcement. He said today it was imperative that the corporation immediately set about the distilling of whiskey, lest the present supply of about 15,000,000 gallons be exhausted at the end of five years which time he estimated will be necessary for the new stock to age.

Criticizing the present system of private ownership and distribution of whiskey, Andrews proposed that the corporation be under government supervision and that it buy all liquor stock now on hand and assume full responsibility for future distribution of medicinal whiskey.

Secretary Mellon who joined President Coolidge in vetoing a previous proposal that the government take over the supplies of medicinal liquor has endorsed the new plan.

While the law now authorizes the internal revenue bureau to make provision for replenishment of the medicinal stock, Andrews asserted that "no thoughtful citizen would want to place upon a government official the embarrassing responsibility of deciding what whiskey distilleries be authorized to manufacture 3,000,000 gallons of whiskey and to require him to undertake to supervise the manufacture."

"The best practical solution to remedy all these conditions seems to be that congress shall by enactment set up a private corporation which will be in fact a beneficial monopoly in that it will purchase and own all the medicinal spirits in the country and be the sole source of supply of new whiskey for medicinal spirits."

"This corporation would provide manufacture for replenishment and, under governmental regulation, distribute medicinal spirits direct to the retail druggist by American Railway Express. This corporation would buy, for immediate delivery in bottles, labeled, sealed and cased, all the private owned stocks, and six or eight distillery warehouses suitably located for efficient distribution."

Methods of financing have not been worked out by Andrews but he does not propose government financial support. He suggests, however, that the government name the first board of directors of the corporation to be composed of "outstanding citizens whose experience will assure proper management, wholesale druggist, banker, physician, life insurance executives, etc."

The purchase price to be paid by the corporation for the outstanding liquor, and the sales price to the purchaser at the drug-store, would be based on prevailing prices during the six months immediately preceding November 1 of this year.

Andrews said it was necessary that congress enact the proposed bill at the approaching short session, "purely as a matter of administration efficiency and without regard to the merits of the prohibition law," because of the fastly diminishing supplies and because existing law "makes it impossible for us to control distribution in such a way as to prevent diversion of medicinal whiskey to beverage uses."

Andrews estimated his plan, if approved, would save the government about \$1,000,000 annually in the administration of the prohibition law by relieving it of the responsibility of stopping diversion of present medicinal supplies to illegal channels.

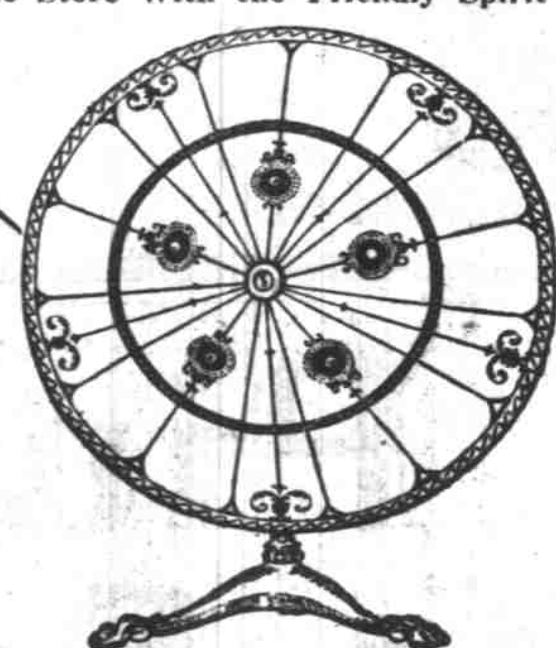
