

DEMON FROM SOUTH READY FOR BATTLE

Richards Has Impressive Record of Knockout Wins Over Good Men

Bud Fisher will complete his training this afternoon and will rest for the remaining time before he steps into the ring with Eddie Richards of Portland at the armory Wednesday night. The big fellow has worked hard in training, although he had a hard time finding sparring partners good enough to give him a real workout.

Cecil Manning, who fought here some last winter, showed up at the armory last night and the night before, going several rounds with Fisher. He gave the Oakland terror plenty of training for a few rounds, but did not last long because of not being in condition. Manning will do some training here this winter in hopes of getting back into the ring soon.

Fisher is in excellent condition for the bout, and says he never felt more like fighting in all his 12 years of ring experience.

Judging from his appearance in training, Fisher has lost none of his speed, and shows aptness and ring cunning enough to match the best. He also has promise of a wicked wallop in case he ever turns it loose.

Richards carries around quite a record of knockouts himself, judging from newspaper clippings. He has sent some prominent haters to the sleep, including Leo Manki, Young Jack Dempsey, Battling Ortega, Bill Hunt of Salem, and Racehorse Roberts. He also fought Jimmy Delaney at one time.

Plenty of fast preliminaries are included on the big card of 35 rounds. The preliminary boys are all working out at the local armory and showing plenty of stuff.

A fight that is good enough in itself for a main event is the claim made for the six round semi-wind-up in which Russell Greene of Salem takes on Young Dealer, Portland terror. Both these men are classed as batters, who can be counted on to give the kind of battle that was seen when Benny Pelz met Phil Bayes here.

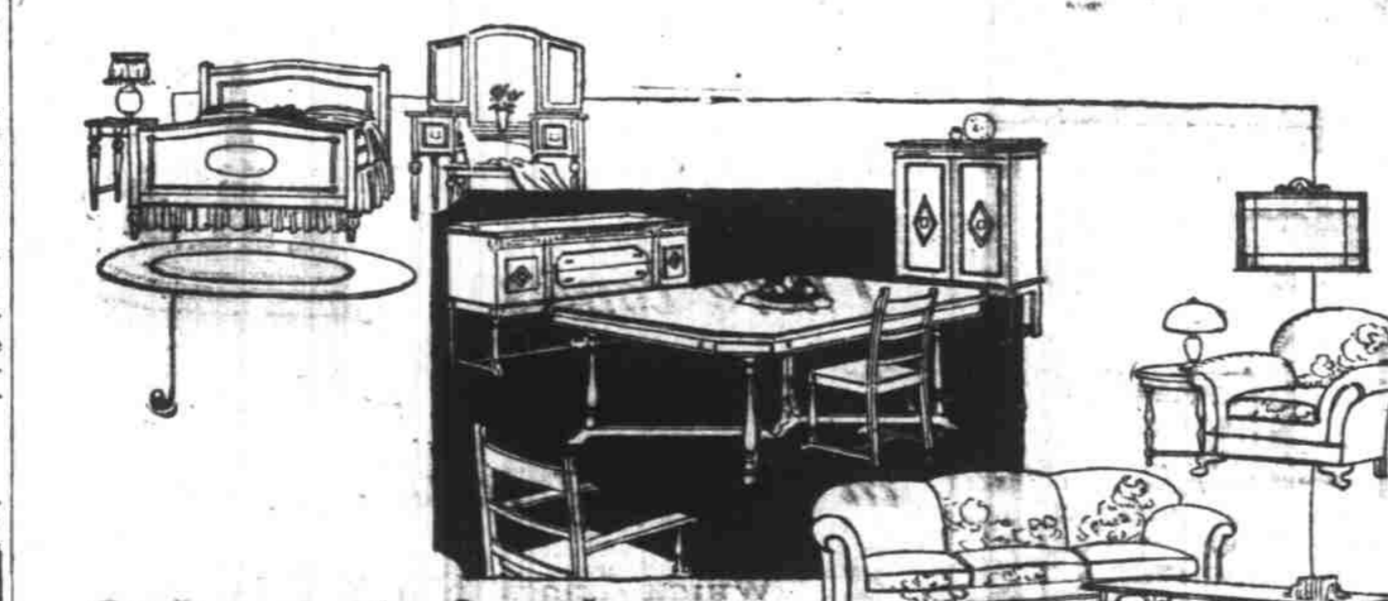
