PENN STATE MAN WINS LONG RACE

William Cox Leads Field of 104 Runners From Start to Finish

NEW YORK, Nov. 22.—(AP)—Racing over the six mile course in record breaking time, William J. Cox of Rochester, N. Y., led Penn State Harriers to their first varsity intercollegiate cross country championship at Vancourtland Park today.

Cox paced a pack of 104 runners from start to finish and breasted the tape in 30:04, thirty seconds better than the mark set a year ago by Willard L. Tibbetts of Harvard. Macauley Smith of Yale, individual champion of 1924, trailed Cox in second place by 40 yards, while James Loucks of Syracuse, who was beaten by a stride in a thrilling battle with Tibbetts last year came home third.
