PLAN SPECIAL TEST FOR ARMY FLYERS

Nineteen Available Vacancies in Second Lieutenant Rating at Present

Qualified flyers are to be offered an opportunity to enter the Army Air Corps as second lieutenants according to an announcement at Governors Island today. A special examination to fill vacancies in that grade is scheduled by the war department to be held from January 17 to 22 at various flying fields throughout the country...

Eligibility to compete in the examination will be limited to candidates who are qualified flyers, and who have graduated from the Air Corps primary and advanced flying school within the past four years, or who have qualified for flying within the past four years. The war department interprets "qualified flyer" to mean any individual who fulfills the necessary mental, moral and physical qualifications for appointment as second lieutenant in the United States Army, and who, in the opinion of the boards appointed to examine the candidate and his records is qualified to enter immediately into the duties required in the tactical units of the air corps...

Applications should be submitted directly to the adjutant general at Washington, and should also request for information pertaining to this examination. Each application should be accompanied by the necessary documentary evidence substantiating the candidate's claim for exemption in the educational examination as well as credentials establishing his practical flying qualifications.

Mary Jane Spurlin Speaks on "People With Vision" at Banquet
