Husband of Former Salem Woman Dies in Portland

PORTLAND, Ore., Dec. 18.—(OP)—David Mackie, 54, prominent Portland real estate operator, was buried here today from the church of St. David Episcopal church, of which he was vestryman, vestry clerk and treasurer. Mr. Mackie died Thursday at a local hospital. He is survived by his widow, Mrs. Genevieve Mackie, of a pioneer Salem family.

Mr. Mackie was born in Forfarshire, Scotland and came to Portland 25 years ago. He became well known throughout the state in connection with his business ventures. He was a member of the Portland lodge of Elks.

Mrs. Mackie was Miss Genevieve Hughes of Salem, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. John Hughes, pioneer pioneers here. She is a sister of J. Frank Hughes and Mrs. A. N. Bush of Salem, and Mrs. William Carter of Portland.
