MEN PLEDGE \$12,000 FOR NEW CANNERY

McMinnville Chamber of Commerce Takes Steps to Aid Fruit Growers

McMINNVILLE, Or., Jan. 12—Steps were taken at the noonday luncheon of the chamber of commerce on Monday which will guarantee the building and operation of a cannery in this city during the ensuing season.

At the regular meeting of the chamber of commerce a special committee, previously appointed to make an investigation of the situation, presented their report. This special committee consisted of M. F. Corrigan, B. A. Klike and W. S. Link. On behalf of the committee, Mr. Corrigan gave a brief review of the situation, and presented figures showing the amount of fruit and nuts that had been handled at this point during the past two years, and also presented the recommendations of the committee and other business men for consideration by the local chamber, which were briefly as follows: That the chamber of commerce sponsor and support a plan to acquire a suitable location having access to proper shipping facilities, and erect thereon a building suitable for canning fruits on a modest scale, and also to care for fresh fruit shipments from this point, and provide facilities for walnut drying, which in the past few years has become quite a factor.

At the present time there is a cannery plant located here, but its present owners do not show any disposition to operate it, and their present intentions are unknown, except that they will not rent or lease the plant. The committee

suggested that a plant more suitable for the purpose for which it is intended, can be erected for less money than the price that has been quoted for the plant now here. The chamber unanimously adopted the recommendations of the committee, and appointed a permanent committee with instructions to proceed to acquire such property as might be necessary to carry out this plan and pledged the sum of \$12,000 for this purpose. The committee has already secured secured options on property suitable for the purpose, and has offered from responsible parties, to rent and operate the plant, and to guarantee a sufficient rental to pay interest on the investment and care for depreciation.

It now appears that the fruit growers of this section will be properly cared for during the coming season, and the fresh fruit shippers will have a base for assembling fresh fruit for shipment.
