Critics Go Into Verbal Ecstasies Over Cecilia Hansen, Violinist

It is not only the critics in New York and Chicago who went into verbal ecstasies over Miss Cecilia Hansen's playing, but the critics of Canada and Florida, of Toledo and Syracuse and New Orleans, the not less important judges who are sometimes called "provincial," but who are in every respect as well qualified as their more famous metropolitan colleagues.

Augustus Bridle, for instance, of the Toronto Daily Star, writes under the headline, "Perfect Tone Poet is Cecilia Hansen."

"Cecilia Hansen is well named. She resembles the glorious classic lady of the keyboard. Scandinavian, tall, slim, blonde, poised like an angel on the wing, she almost floats upon the stage, and without a gesture of common gulle, begins to work a sort of natural magic. She is glorious in her youth, without maudlin excesses. She suggested the seraph; calm, strong, placidly passionate and poetic. Long arms and long, lithe fingers, her whole body seems to take a subtle joy in the violin, swaying gently, always poised with power and a feminine majesty, in one so young quite remarkable.

"At once she captivates. Encores seem ready to fly down like Raphael's cherubs. But about this Scandinavian girl there is a veil of modest reserve that treats an encore as a rarity. Even mediocre art might be tolerated from one so graciously dignified and poetic; but she has none of that. She has a beautiful violin and a splendid bow; intended by nature to have such things as technical media for an art that springs first from pure nature and second from the cultivation of the studio.

"There is much more than Auer in her playing; she blends the best elements of Heifetz and Elman and improves upon both. She has her own way of touching greatness. No player ever heard here can surpass her in tone production."

"Yepmita" in the Evening Telegram said: "Radiant and refreshing—that is the song of the violin in the hands of Cecilia Hansen, a young Russian violinist. Tall, fair-haired, and beautiful as a pictured saint of northern climes, the

young player seems but a physical embodiment of the song her genius sings. Her tone is rich and vibrant, powerful. It is a tone that grips you, holds you fast and leaves you satisfied. It is tender beyond description, but its sympathy is not narcotic. It is passionate, but there is heaven's blessed breeze about it. It is a new song Cecilia Hansen's feelings, beauty and courage, and the song never falters in a single phrase.

"Of her technique it is unnecessary to say anything beyond that she can do what any can do—Fritz Kreisler, Heifetz, Elman and the like. But it seems to us that she can do something these cannot. She can make you feel the deepest emotion without encouraging you to be sorry for yourself."

Miss Hansen will play here on Tuesday, Jan. 18, at the Elshore theater.
