Event Significant in Musical History of Salem Is Scheduled for Tonight

A large majority of Salem music lovers, the concert scheduled at the Elsinore this evening, is the most important musical event in the history of Salem. At that time Cecilia Hansen, beautiful and talented young Russian violinist, will be heard here for the first time, the present tour being the second time she has been heard on the Pacific coast. The debut of Cecilia Hansen in New York city in October of 1922 proved the most sensational of any violinist since the great Heifetz debut of 1917. Public and critics were enraptured and columns have been written describing the "Hansen tone," technique and the great beauty and spirituality of the artist. At that time Richard Aldrich in the New York Times reported: "Peer of the Auer clan, playing like a man, but yet a woman. Cecilia Hansen made her first appearance in America yesterday afternoon. Those present are likely to remember the occasion for Miss Hansen will not long remain a stranger to the greater public of New York. In five minutes she had captured her house."

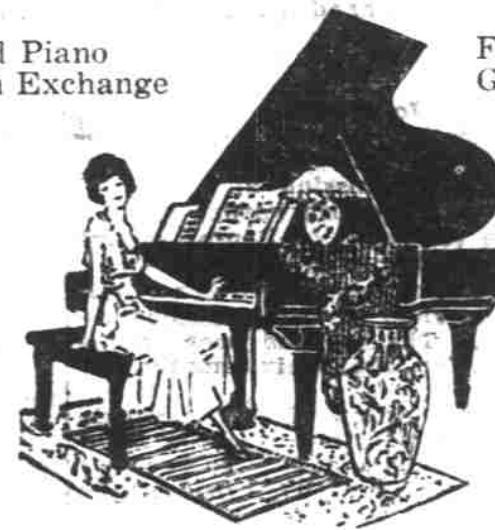
