

Salem Gets Last Chance at Good Boxing in

TENDLER, GORDON READY FOR GONG

Future of Fight Game in This City Depends on Turn-out for Battles

Whether boxing of a class such as is usually seen only in much larger cities will be supported by Salem fans is to be tried out by matchmaker Harry Plant at the armory tonight, when 32 rounds of fast mixing will be put on, topped with a 10 round bout between Sailor Willie Gordon of Portland and Vic Tandler of Everett; and on the fans' support tonight will depend the future of the fight game in Salem. If enough of them turn out and show that they want this kind of boxing show, there will be more of them, but not otherwise.

The main event, who have each posted \$50 forfeit to make 122 pounds, will weigh in at 2 o'clock this afternoon. Both are reported to be in the best of condition and confident; Tandler of repeating his former victory, and Gordon of getting adequate revenge.

Early indications were that the fans' support would fill all of Matchmaker Plant's requirements; the seats were going fast

Thursday, and indications were for a packed house. Assurances were given that the building will be heated early, so that no fan need stay away for fear of the flu.

The first two preliminaries completing the card, were announced Thursday evening. Loren Watts and Art Golden of Salem will go four rounds at 144 pounds, and Bill Motjil of Stayton and Johnny Welch of Auburn will also put on a four round go. Welch weighs 140 and Motjil a pound less.

In the third bout, as previously announced, Red Wicraft of Stayton and Chuck Herman of Silverton will battle for four rounds.

The semi final, scheduled to go six rounds, will see Billy Robinson of Portland and Ted Fox of Independence in action. They have fought before, and almost as much interest is being manifested in this bout as in the main event.

Californian to Defend Fly-weight Crown Against Hardy Scotchman

NEW YORK, Jan. 20.—(AP)—A 29 year old Scotsman will sally forth the resin dust of the Madison Square Garden ring tomorrow night in quest of the world's fly-weight crown which Jimmy Wilde lost here more than three years ago.

Elky Clark's attempt to regain the title for Great Britain from Fidel La Barba of California, will mark the far west titleholder's most important eastern conflict since he mounted the throne a year and a half ago. It will also be the champion's first "long distance" fight here during his brief reign among the little men of fistiana, for La Barba, after being limited to six round contests, in New York, before reaching his majority, this time will have twelve three minute rounds within which to clinch his claim to world's supremacy.

FRESHMEN QUINTET TO PLAY UNIVERSITY SECOND TEAM

Playing on the enemy's home floor—a small one similar to that which hampered the Bearcats' efforts at Albany Tuesday night—the Willamette university basket-ball team faces one of the most crucial battles which it is likely to encounter in the present north-west conference season, when it lines up against Pacific university at Forest Grove tonight.

Pacific's victory over Linfield was comparable to that which Willamette gained over the Wild-cats here, so Pacific apparently does not outclass the Bearcats, if conditions were equal; but to-night again Pacific will be playing at home, so the Methodists will be opposing considerable odds.

Coach Spec Keene plans to start Litchfield and Riedel as forwards, Hartley at center and Ashby and Ledbetter as guards. Houk, Min-to and Flesher are all expected to get into the game. Ten men will make the trip.

The Willamette freshmen will accompany the varsity to Forest Grove, playing a preliminary game against the Pacific university second team.
