It was natural that during his last concert tour abroad Mr. Werrenrath was most anxious to sing in Copenhagen. The papers the morning following his concert there were loud in their acclaim, praising not only his voice but his manner of singing.

The Copenhagen papers said: "Mr. Werrenrath proved to be an exquisitely tasteful and musicianly singer. His baritone is smooth and beautiful in tone, his pianissimo being especially enticing."

"He is an artist from top to toe. His delivery bears the imprint of the surest of musical culture. His piano is exquisite. In short, he is a singer who is able to hold his own anywhere."

Ways and means by which music may be profitably correlated in the school, the home, the club and in the community will be given consideration. Mrs. Krassig will have charge of a musical program.

Journalist at Legislature Announces Engagement to Professor Turnbull
Of interest to Salem friends, especially those who are following the events at the state house, is the engagement of Miss Mary Lou Burton of Eugene, Cal., to Professor George S. Turnbull of the University of Oregon school of journalism. The news was told at the home of Dean and Mrs. Eric W. Allen in Eugene. The wedding will be an event of next month.

The morning Register adds the following details:
Miss Burton was graduated from the school of journalism with the class of 1923. Since that time she has served as a successful and popular newspaper woman with the Central Oregon Press of Bend, with the Humboldt Standard of Eureka (Calif.) and with the Oregon Voter, Portland. She is at present covering the session of the legislature at Salem for the latter. While an undergraduate, Miss Burton was a member of Professor Turnbull's class.

Mr. Turnbull came to the University of Oregon as Professor of journalism in 1917 from the Seattle Daily Times of whose editorial staff he was a member. Prior to

his connection with the Times he had held various editorial positions with the Seattle Post-Intelligencer, and with other metropolitan and rural papers in the northwest. He was graduated from the University of Washington with high honors in 1915.
