Elinore Theater

It's a great joy to see women assert themselves. Especially when, by so doing, they turn the tables on their husbands. It's such a situation that we all the more to Maclean's "Cradle Snatchers" which will be at the Elinore Theatre Feb. 2.

Three wives resent the fibbing of their husbands. They decide to do a bit of gallivanting themselves, and the result is a hilarious melange of comedy and drama which is caused as much by the stinging satire of the drama, as by the frankly funny situations. The play deals with wifely revolt. It threatens the convention and it shows a few husbands that, what the authors have phrased it, what's sauce for the goose is sauce for the gander. Russell Medcraft and Norma Mitchell have written their solution of present-day domestic problems in fast comedy mood. They have given their players good parts, and their audience was just a bit dazed with the rapidity of the first act, but due to the later scenes splendidly with gales of laughter.

Carlos, of the dance team of Carlos and Jinette, featured in the Fanchon and Marco, stage presentation "Dance Poems" coming to The Elinore Sunday and Monday, wanted to go on the stage but his parents, owners of one of the largest theatres in Mexico, objected to a stage career.

As a youth Carlos attended performances and longed to be behind the footlights—an actor—a dancer.

His hopes seemed futile. When he was eighteen years old his country was rocked by a revolution. His father, a brigadier general, on the side of Diaz, was killed. The revolutionists were victorious. Among the exiles were Carlos and seven brothers and a sister. He got them across the line to San Antonio, a thrilling experience in itself. Supporting seven hungry was a battle for assistance with the odds against him. In two years he had saved enough money to get to Los Angeles—still dreaming of his career. He got odd jobs in motion pictures and played a season with the Mission Play of which Frederick Wards was the star. He missed getting the juvenile lead in a production based on Rubaiyat by a matter of moments; but later contracted with Fanchon & Marco, with whom he has been connected for three and a half years.

During his work for Fanchon & Marco he has also won recognition at motion picture studios and has appeared in countless productions both as a solo dancer and with his talented and beautiful partner—Jinette, who will appear with him in "Dance Poems" at The Elinore.

His experiences in life have given

him a philosophy in which that fickle and evasive sprite, Destiny, Chance or whatever you call it, plays a prominent part, because when you stop to think of it—it took a revolution in Mexico to give Carlos his opportunity of getting on the stage—the goal of his dreams.

The committee on education held a meeting last night to discuss numerous bills. One bill which will probably be withdrawn this morning related to the high school at Ontario. It asked that some means be provided to give the graduate from that high school extra credit for the 10 credits over the standard requirements in state high schools. The law requires high school students to have 15 credits, and the Ontario school gives a course of 15 credits. The committee was advised that this could be done through the local board of directors without any legislation.

Cities Granted Authority to Issue Bonds of Deficit

All cities having a population of less than 50,000 may have authority to issue notes or bonds to cover deficits caused by the failure of property owners assessed for improvements, to sign applications to pay their assessments in installments, under the provision of the Bancroft act, according to Mr. Briggs, bill No. 47 which passed the house yesterday. The notes or bonds shall not run for a longer period than three years. When the money is collected from the property owners it shall be applied on the payment of the bonds. These are some of the provisions of the bill.

The committee on forestry sped house bill 134 on its way with a favorable report at its meeting yesterday afternoon. The measure makes \$25,000 of the forest patrol account immediately available for use in the payment of fire fighters in the time of extreme hazard. The state forester handles the fund and is required to furnish a surety bond of \$25,000 approved as to form by the attorney general.
