ANOTHER SUGAR FACTORY

The Utah-Idaho Sugar company, the company that is proposing to build a factory at Salem, in case it can get the proper cooperation of our farmers in producing the beets, has just purchased the holdings of the Great Western Sugar company at Belle Fourche, South Dakota, consisting of a farm, six beet dumps (loading stations) and miscellaneous properties.

PASS THE FISH BILL

"Section 1. From and after the taking effect of this act it shall be unlawful to have or use in the Columbia river and in any portion thereof under the concurrent jurisdiction of the state of Oregon west of the Cascade locks any traps or seines for the purpose of catching or taking any fish whatsoever."
"Section 2. Any person, firm or corporation violating any of the provisions of this act shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and, upon conviction thereof, shall be punished by a fine of not less than \$250 and not more than \$1,000, or imprisonment in the county jail for a period of not less than thirty days nor more than ninety days, or both such fine and imprisonment."

HB 364, by Lonergan—Requiring plats of property within six miles of cities to be filed with municipal officials.
HB 365, by Revision of Laws Committee—Limiting practice of persons not admitted to bar to justice courts.

HB 400, by Repeal of Laws Committee—Amending law affecting removal of county seats.
HB 401, by Repeal of Laws Committee—Repealing sections relating to duties of courts.
HB 402, by Repeal of Laws Committee—Repealing sections relating to forest fires.
HB 403, by Repeal of Laws Committee—Repealing section relating to payment of fees prior to 1894.

SB 148, by Linn county delegation—Appropriating money for relief of Ada A. Dunlap of Linn county.
SB 149, by Hall—Increasing salaries of officials of Curry county.
SB 150, by Joseph—Standardizing salaries of deputy sheriffs, clerks and assessors in Multnomah county.
SB 151, by Moser, et al—Increasing salaries of constable and deputy constables of Multnomah county.

deputy would be increased from \$125 to \$175 a month, while the salaries of the other deputies in the department would be advanced from \$100 to \$150 a month.
The salaries of the deputies in the various offices of Multnomah county would be standardized under a bill introduced by Senator Joseph.
The Linn county delegation has introduced a bill providing for an

appropriation of \$3000 for Mrs. Ada A. Dunlap, widow of the late Sheriff William Dunlap of Linn county. Sheriff Dunlap was killed three years ago while in the performance of his official duties. The senate approved a bill introduced by the revision of laws committee which would make more ample the incorporation and operations of highway improvement districts. Under this bill the district would be limited from rolling bonds in excess of six per cent of the assessed value of the district. The present law allows these districts to vote made based on 10 per cent of their assessed valuations. Following a lengthy debate a bill providing that a summons might be served by any person over the age of 21 years was referred to the judiciary committee. This bill was attacked by a number of senators who declared that its passage would invite fraud and place the property of litigants in jeopardy. Another bill approved by the senate gives the courts discretion in the forfeiture of hunting and angling licenses. Under the existing laws it is mandatory for

the courts to forfeit these licenses when a person has been convicted of the game or fish laws. The law was held by a number of senators to be unfair in that many of the law violations were technical and not intention upon the persons accused.
Under a bill introduced by Senator Strayer and passed on third reading weed control districts could be organized with the consent of seven property owners. The present law provides that 25 property owners must consent to such an organization.
