ROOM TO IMPROVE

MANY PUPILS IN SCHOOLS HAVE DEFECTIVE TEETH

Considerable room for improvement in the care of teeth of the pupils in Marion county schools was discovered by the Marion County Dental unit in school surveys made during January, according to the report made public Tuesday.

In the ten schools visited in one week, an average of 24.4 of the pupils in each were found to have defective teeth, the report states. In one small school, all of the pupils had defects in this particular, and the percentage was in no case lower than 60 per cent in this group of schools.

Despite this present condition, satisfactory progress in remedying the defects is being made, the report states. Many corrections have been made because of the difficulty of traveling at the present season.

Surveys were made in January in 12 districts, including both the grade and high schools in five of these districts. Educational material, lectures and motion pictures, were presented to the Lincoln-McKinley community club, the Clear Lake community club, and the Hickman-Polk County grade school and student teachers.

Stewart was driving an Oakland touring but did not give the identity of the other drivers or a description of the cars except that the truck was of the two section type.

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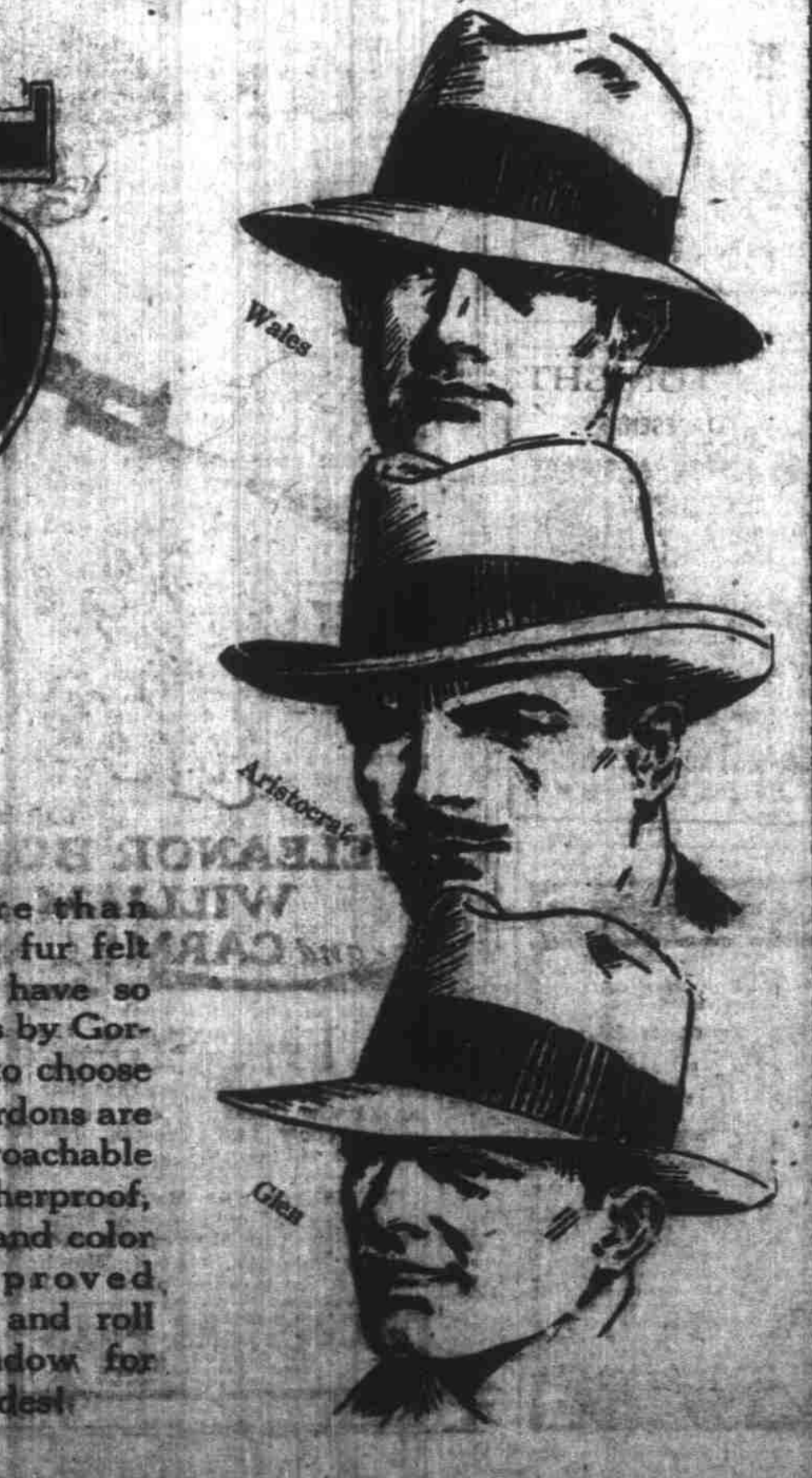
