Memorial Introduced in Senate Would Confine Sales to Actual Needs

Sales of timber from government reserves in Oregon would be confined to cases of actual need or where such sales are desired to promote needed common carrier railroad development, in ville Cal.: Rex E. Howard of Saevent officials at Washington heed the provisions of a memorial introduced in the senate yesterday by Senator Marks and others.

"Timber is now sold in unfair competition with the private owner," read the memorial. The private owner's timber is subject to initial cost, interest and carrying charges, forest patrol and taxation, while the operator in national forest stumpage has not the usual large investment tied up in stumpage but pays for it practically as it is cut and by avoiding the burden of carrying cost and interest.

"The present policy of conducting federal timber sales does not recognize the economic law of supply and demand, and thereby has demoralized the timber market in Oregon.

"Government sales agents are still seeking buyers for large tracts of federal timber and this practice is unfair to private own-Salem Tuesduay. 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
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
