SALES OF TIMBER CONTROL SOUGHT

Memorial Introduced in Senate Would Confine Sales to Actual Needs

Sales of timber from government reserves in Oregon would be confined to cases of actual need or where such sales are desired to promote needed common carrier railroad development, in event officials at Washington heed the provisions of a memorial introduced in the senate yesterday by Senator Marks and others.

"Timber is now sold in unfair competition with the private owner," read the memorial. The private owner's timber is subject to initial cost, interest and carrying charges, forest patrol and taxation, while the operator in national forest stumps has not the usual large investment tied up in stumpage but pays for it practically as it is cut and by avoiding the burden of carrying cost and interest.

"The present policy of conducting federal timber sales does not recognize the economic law of supply and demand, and thereby has demoralized the timber market in Oregon.

"Government sales agents are still seeking buyers for large tracts of federal timber and this practice is unfair to private owners of timber lands who pay taxes thereon for the maintenance of government and who, in many cases have difficulty in paying their taxes.

"Your memorialists request that sales of timber from the government reserves in Oregon be confined to cases of actual need or where such sales are desired to promote needed common railroad development of the state surrounding timber which is sold and that no more timber be sold until it is conclusively shown that it is actually needed or that such sale is desired by residents of that part of the state in which said timber is situated to assist in the needed development thereof."

Silas E. Howard DIES AT CORNING Was: Veteran Carrier of Salem Postoffice; Member of Old Salem Family

Silas E. Howard died at his home in Corning, Tehama county, California, at 9 a. m. Monday, Feb. 7th, 1927, aged 72 years.

The father of the deceased was Capt. D. C. Howard, who was a prominent resident of Salem for many years, up to the time of his death, a dozen or so years ago. "Si" Howard, as he was well known in Salem, became a substitute carrier of the Salem postoffice in 1896.

He served in that capacity for 10 years when he was made a regular carrier and remained in that capacity till he was retired at 65, seven years ago, on a pension, when he went to Corning, Cal., bought a home and several acres of land and cultivated fruits and kept bees in that district famous for his honey.

He visited Salem nearly every year after his removal to California. He had a very wide acquaintance here, and many friends.

He was the husband of Mrs. Jennie Howard, father of Elbert J. Howard of Los Angeles; Mrs. Effie E. Hawley of Corning; Mrs. Edith C. Rogers of Portland; Mrs. Stella Hawes of Oakland, Cal.; Ernest A. Howard of Oroville, Cal.; Silas S. Howard of Porterville, Cal.; Rex E. Howard of Salem; David Howard of Seattle; and Mrs. Clara Shuler of Sacramento; brother of J. E. Howard of Bend, Oregon; Mrs. C. J. Driver of Portland; Mrs. J. W. Phippings of Charleston, Wash.; and J. B. Howard of Wenatchee, Wash. He was a member of the Salem camp, Modern Woodmen.

Interment will be at Salem, from the Rigdon mortuary. Funeral announcement later. Rex E. Howard of Salem was with his father during his last hours and sent the news of his passing to the Salem postoffice employees.
