

Fighting Comeback in Second Half Saves Game for Willamette Team

COLLEGE OF IDAHO DEFEATED 29 TO 22

Visitors Ahead First Period — Hawk and Hartley Lead Bearcat Rally

The Cubs, those cardinal and gold sweated youths who handle the crowds at Willamette university athletic events and make themselves useful at all times, scarcely bothered to ring the historic victory bell when the Bearcats won from College of Idaho Thursday night, but Friday night they were mighty glad of the chance.

Willamette won 29 to 22, but predictions after the first game that the Coyotes would come back strong were more than fulfilled when the boys from Caldwell got the jump on the Bearcats and held the lead every minute of the first half, when the score was 15 to 11.

That wasn't any discredit to the Willamette players, for the Idaho team put up as speedy an offensive game as has been seen in the Willamette gymnasium this year, aside from that displayed by Oregon. The Bearcats fought hard, but couldn't get started, and although they broke for the basket with their usual speed, the ball always seemed to trickle off the edge.

But Spec Keene seemed to know what was the matter, for after he had staged his little curtain lecture between halves, his team came back with a rush. The Idaho guards still kept them from scoring at close range, but the Methodists managed to break in far enough to jump some markers from a little behind the foul line.

At this point the game speeded up to about twice its previous pace, and the ball kept slipping through the Bearcats' basket until, after eight minutes, they were leading 23 to 17.

Hawk started this rally with a couple of pretty shots, and he and Hartley carried it on for the most part, with Reidel and Litchfield adding a few points to swell the total. Meanwhile the Bearcat defense, with Ledbetter as its main spring, came to life and held the visitors to only two baskets throughout the twenty minutes. The second half score was 18 to 7.

The Bearcats looked as good in this part to the game as they have at any time during the season, and if Keene can get them keyed up to the same pitch next Wednesday night when College of Puget Sound invades the local campus, they stand a fair chance of turning the tables on the Loggers and plac-
