

Paddock Lowers 250 Meter Mark

Three Seconds Out From 36 Year Old Record by California Sprinter

CLAREMONT, Cal., Feb. 12.—(AP)—Charley Paddock, sprint champion, opened his fourteenth year of cinder path campaigning auspiciously today by establishing a new world's record for the 250 meter distance, cutting more than three seconds off a mark which has stood for 36 years. Paddock's time, as reported by Pomona officials, was 27.3-5 seconds for the 250 meter dash.

Officials of the Pomona college interclass meet in which Paddock ran his exhibition race today, said the mark probably will be allowed since there was no wind to aid the runner, and three of the four timers agreed on the time. A fourth stop watch varied a fraction of a second from the three.

The sprint champion gave hand-leaps of from 20 to 60 yards to three Pomona runners and beat them all handsly.

W. T. McPherson of New Zealand ran the 250 meters in 31.2 seconds in February, 1891, to establish the mark which has stood until today. Paddock's time also better the indoor record for the distance of 29 seconds established by Loren Murchison of New York.

CLAREMONT, Cal., Feb. 12.—(AP)—Edmond college athletic officials announced this afternoon that Charles Paddock had broken the fourth world's record of 31.5 seconds for the 250 meter dash when he covered the distance in 27.3-5 seconds in a scheduled record breaking try.

Immediately after the new record was announced as established the officials began re-measuring the track to make certain the distance was correct. The track was in excellent shape although the atmosphere was a bit cool for the sprint.
