SALEM HIGH FACES CRUCIAL CONTEST

West Linn Men Coming With Set Purpose of Knocking Locals Over

Facing the most crucial game of the district season, the Salem high school basketball squad will leave today for West Linn, where it will meet the speedy quintet of the West Linn high school, regarded as Salem's only rival for the district title.

West Linn has defeated most of the Portland high school teams, and recently showed its strength by winning from the Chemawa Indian school quintet.

For several years West Linn, coached by Rein Jackson, former Willamette university athlete, has contested Salem's right to compete in the state tournament, but has failed, and because it is in the same district, West Linn has never qualified for the tourney, although it was stronger than some of the teams that did come.

This year the team from the north end of the valley apparently has its best chance in years to qualify, and Salem high is anticipating the hardest battle of the season on the West Linn court tonight. A return game will be played here March 5, and in case the teams are tied, a third game on a neutral floor will probably be necessary.

BASEBALL TO FORE OPS OUT OF RACE FOR CHAMPIONSHIP

Meeting to Organize Salem Team is Scheduled

Organization to handle the business end of baseball in Salem for the coming season will be effected at a meeting next Monday evening, it was announced Thursday by Frisco Edwards, who is expected to have charge of the Senators this year.

At the meeting Monday night, financial and administrative matters will be discussed, and also the question of what steps should be taken about entering one of several leagues which will be formed in the Willamette valley this spring.

Bill Steers is also reported as looking toward Salem as a summer habitat again this year.

MISSOULA, Mont., Feb. 17.—(AP)—Montana's first conference victory of the season came at the expense of the Oregon Aggie basketball team here tonight when the Grizzlies humbled the Aggies 38 to 25.

A powerful man to man defense combined with the most accurate shooting this season gave the University of Montana its first Pacific coast conference victory against eight defeats. At half time Montana led 27 to 13.

Under the Northwest conference rules, College of Puget Sound will be unable to win its way into a three cornered tie for the basketball championship, it was discovered Thursday. The title is decided on percentages, and Puget Sound, by scheduling no games with College of Idaho, lost its chance for a tie.

Willamette university will be tied with Whitman if the local quintet defeats Pacific university, with eight games won and two lost each. The two extra games Whitman has played with College of Idaho will not count, as no two teams were to play more than two games.

The Bears' victory Wednesday night, statistics of the game compiled by Physical Director Spec Keene revealed. The Willamette men scored 13 field baskets out of 60 tries, while the visitors tried only 55 shots and 11 of them were successful. In other words, the Bears made more chances for themselves and scored a slightly higher percentage of shots.

On free throws the locals were even more accurate, making five out of seven tries, while the Loggers made only six out of 14 shots from the foul line.

Litchfield of Willamette, in addition to being high point man, made the remarkable record of scoring five baskets on 11 tries, an unusually high percentage for any player and especially so considering that he was closely guarded on some of his throws. Reidel shot three times for one goal, and Ashby made two out of seven tries.

Amid scenes unparalleled in the history of boxing, the promoter secluded himself in his private office, as hundreds bombarded the place in a futile effort to obtain gate-boards. Under the record demand, word reached the state athletic commission that speculators' prices for \$20 ringside seats had jumped from \$75 to \$125 and \$150.

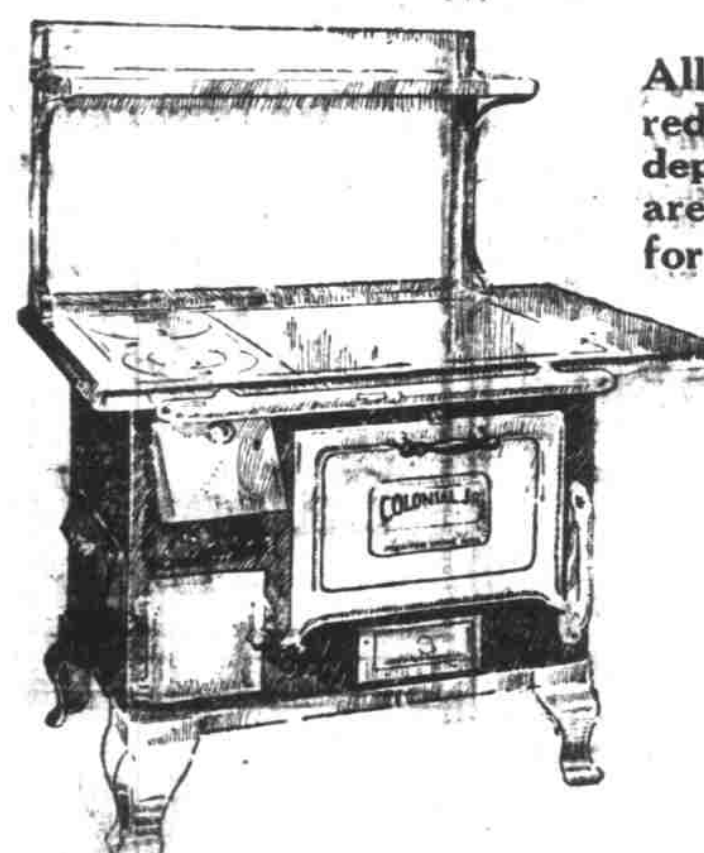
